# COMMUNITY & RURAL DEVELOPMENT & INTEGRATION

#### **LCDC**

An LCDC meeting will take place on the 10th September to discuss the recommendations from the LECP Advisory Steering Group on the high-level goals and updates to the socioeconomic statement of the Local Economic & Community Plan. It is envisaged that a second LCDC meeting will take place towards the end of September to consider the mid-year review of the Empowering Communities Programme and the Draft Corporate Plan.

#### **SICAP**

Pobal and the Department of Rural & Community Development are organising a series of SICAP Support Workshops to share experiences of SICAP frontline staff and LCDC support staff in delivering SICAP 2024-28. The workshop for the western region is being hosted by Galway County Council and will be held on 18th September 2024.

#### LOCAL ECONOMIC & COMMUNITY PLAN

The LECP Advisory Steering Group met on 6th September 2024, and at that meeting, Hub Planning presented on the High-Level Goals, the Draft Objectives, and the Methodology for Action Planning.

# **HEALTHY IRELAND**

A Health and Wellbeing Sub-Committee will take place on Thursday 19th September at 2pm to discuss progress on the implementation of the Health & Wellbeing Fund 2024. Work is progressing on various elements of the Fund, for example, funding is assigned to develop Activator Pole Training Programmes and Signage at suitable locations across the County. Expressions of Interest have been invited for "Inclusive Community Gardens" which is aimed at increasing the range of social and leisure activities in Community Gardens for family friendly events, and targeted activities for older people, people with disabilities, and youth. Targeted Health & Wellbeing Events are being organised on the 4 offshore islands for September & October to provide information and links to services on targeted health needs for men & women identified through community consultation events held in May 2024.

# SOCIAL INCLUSION

# AGE FRIENDLY PROGRAMME

In conjunction with Age Friendly Ireland, Healthy Ireland and the HSE, projects have now been identified on all 4 offshore islands under the once-off funding allocation of €28,746.17. These range from Social & Leisure Packs at community meeting rooms, sports equipment, to



accessibility and age friendly measures at Community Parks and Community Gardens. It is intended that Open Days will be held at all relevant facilities once the projects have been completed, with the intention of increasing the number of older people engaging in regular social & leisure activities at these community facilities & amenities.

# COMHAIRLE NA NÓG

A Steering Group meeting is scheduled on Wednesday 25th September at 4.30 p.m. The chosen topics for 2024 are Mental Health and Transport. Comhairle members are progressing the topic of Mental Health with a particular focus on teacher's awareness to student Mental Health. On the topic of Transport, the members are collating information from young people from across the county to submit a report to the Transport for Ireland regarding issues on rural transport for young people.

# **COMMUNITY AWARDS**





Pride of Place Judging took place in Williamstown on the afternoon of Thursday 5<sup>th</sup> September where Williamstown showcased their important community amenities and facilities as part of their entry in the Population Category of 0-300. Following this, the judges, Tom Dowling, and John Briggs, visited Kinvara on the morning of Friday 6<sup>th</sup> September, where Kinvara showcased initiatives such as Kinvara Plastic Free, Ballyclery Tree Planting, and other Biodiversity & Climate Action initiatives for their entry in this judging

# PUBLIC PARTICIPATION NETWORK (PPN)

#### **ACTING AS AN INFORMATION HUB:**

Weekly Digests and Monthly Newsletter has been circulated to over 1,300 PPN Member Groups which are also are posted on PPN social media and PPN website. Monthly Newsletters are also emailed to County Councillors and posted on the staff internal message board on the Intranet. The PPN shares information, which is submitted by multiple sections in the Council, other organisations, PPN member groups, government departments, PPN's internal news and events, and information we source ourselves on topics including decision making and representation, Public Consultations, Funding and Training for community groups, Meetings, Community Activities. Occasionally dedicated emails are forwarded to PPN members on behalf of other sections in the Council and other organisations, these are reserved for top priority news items.

#### **BUILDING CAPACITY**

The PPN will be arranging training and onboarding sessions for new PPN Representatives over the Autumn and Training for all PPN member groups will also be arranged over the Autumn. Events which PPN staff and members are attending in September include: Galway Disability Forum meeting (a PPN Linkage Group), PPN Secretariat Meeting (advisory body of PPN), Deaf Community Coffee Morning, PPN National Workers Network Conference.

# **REPRESENTATIVE ROLE:**

Public Participation Network Representative (PPN Rep) positions were advertised in July 2024 with elections taking place in August and onboarding to take place in September 2024, for the positions of 2 Board Members for Galway Rural Development and 1 community representative on Baile Chláir Per Cent for Art public art selection panel. Further PPN Representative Roles to be advertised in September include: Eleven PPN Reps on the newly formed Galway County Council Strategic Policy Committees.

# COMMUNITY INTEGRATION FORUM

The first meeting of the Community Integration Forum takes place in September, bringing together services working to integrate migrants into the community. In the month of August, the following were achieved by the Integration Team:

 14 information clinics for International Protection Applicants and Beneficiaries of Temporary Protection. The clinics are where the Integration Support Workers can give information on education, training, employment, and health. Linking people with local groups enables them to integrate in their new communities. The Integration Team



linked with Tidy Towns to offer volunteering opportunities to residents in accommodation centres.





- 4 Group sessions providing information on local supports to accommodation residents.
- 2 stakeholder events with services and migrants.
- A community event for Ukraine Independence Day was held on 24/08/24, where Ukrainians living in the city and county met to share food, music, and crafts.







The Integration Team worked with the Housing Association, Tuath and local support services to welcome the new Ukrainian arrivals in the Modular Homes in Ballinasloe, helping them to settle into their new community.

#### HER OUTDOORS WEEK

The fourth year of this initiative from Sport Ireland was a resounding success with more

events running than ever before, celebrating the variety and excitement that Galway's coastal and mountain landscapes have to offer.

HER Outdoors week functions to encourage more females to take part in outdoor activities, but also demonstrates the importance of outdoor recreation, its role in physical and mental health, social inclusion, nature connectedness, environmental awareness, and community cohesion.



This year's focus was not just on females partaking in activities but also served to highlight those that deliver, volunteer, coach, educate and instruct in clubs and the outdoor industry in Galway. Many of the service providers used this year were female owned and run businesses. Galway Sports Partnership partnered with clubs and education centres that had strong female representation in their committees and operations.





The late summer weather was uncooperative at times, but despite this challenge 15 events successfully went ahead in locations across the city and county (Woodquay, Salthill, the Docks, Merlin Woods, Bearna/Cappagh Woods, Portumna, Loughrea, Belclare, Ballinasloe, Clonbur, Roundstone, Carna, An Cheathrú Rua and Inis Oírr). Over 150 women, girls and even some babies took part in a variety of water and land-based activities including: sea dips, snorkelling, kayaking, windsurfing, paddle sports, sailing, rowing, orienteering, forest hikes, outdoor yoga, cycling, and trail running.

Each year the places on HER Outdoors events are in high demand, so this year places were reserved for each event to include females from target groups that would experience barriers to participation due to factors like socioeconomic adversity, disability, discrimination, or inaccessibility.

#### BALLINASLOE BUGGY BUDDIES

An 8-week buggy buddies programme kicked off on 6th August 2024 in Ballinasloe with 11 participants taking part. Galway Sports Partnership



partnered with the fantastic County Council owned facilities Dunlo Recreation Athletics Track and the Ballinasloe Library to offer both an outdoor cardio and indoor pelvic floor element to the programme.

# **INCLUSIVE TRIATHLON**

Galway Sports Partnerships third annual Inclusive Triathlon took place on Wednesday 3rd



July in Kilcornan
Clarinbridge. This is a
collaborative initiative
with Galway sports
Partnership, Triathlon
Ireland, and Disability
Services in Galway.
Joanne Murphy from

TriTalkingSport was the Master of Ceremonies and there were over 70 participants from Brothers of Charity Services in Galway City and County. Participants took part in either a



relay format (1xswimmer, 1xtrike/biker & 1x walk/jogger) or they could complete all 3 elements as an individual. The swim element was 10mins in the pool and the number of lengths were counted by their carers, the bike/trike element was minimum 2 laps of a 500m loop, and the walk/jog element was 2 laps of a 500m loop with carers timing the bike and jog element. The event ended with a medal for each participant who took part and a trophy for the overall winning team/service.

# **INCLUSIVE SUMMER PROGRAMMES**

Galway Sports Partnership through funding from the HSE supported several inclusive summer camps across Galway City and County. This work is facilitated by Galway Sports Partnerships Sports Inclusion Disability Officer who works to break down the barriers to participation for this cohort.

# **CONNEMARA WALKS**

Galway Sports Partnership held a 6-Week Walking programme in Rosscahill Woods. This programme was designed for all fitness levels and was hugely enjoyable and a social experience for all who took part. This group have



continued to meet and have now transitioned into a local community fitness facility for the Autumn/Winter period.





Galway Sports Partnership partnered with the Beanna Beola Walking Group to host two walks in the Connemara area – Mám Eán and Casla Bog Walk.

Mám Eán Walk took place on 30<sup>th</sup> August and participants enjoyed some beautiful weather, views, and

chats! The next walk is at Casla Bog Walk on 28<sup>th</sup> September as part

of National Walking Week which takes place from 23<sup>rd</sup> September-29<sup>th</sup> September.



#### **OUGHTERARD COMMUNITY EVENT**



Galway Sports Partnership attend Oughterard Community Centre and Clann Resource Centres Activity Information Event. This is the second year of this event, and it is to showcase all that Oughterard has to offer in Physical Activity and through this event a booklet is developed to help sign post people and increase awareness of all that is on offer in the area.

#### **ACTIVATOR TASTER EVENT**

Galway Sports Partnership in collaboration with local physical activity tutors Carol Slevin & Sharon Williamson T/A Move and the HSE Integrated Care of the Older Person (ICPOP) Team, held an Activator Walking Pole Come & Try Session in the Emerald Ballroom, Ballinasloe on 27th August. 44 people of all abilities and mobility levels attended the session,



including 4 participants from the Brothers of Charity. It was a fantastic morning of activity full of positivity, fun and movement. 35 people have already signed up for the 6-week programme due to start on 17th September.



#### BALLINASLOE COMMUNITY SPORTS HUB

Ballinasloe Community Sports Hub will officially be launched on 11<sup>th</sup> October in the Emerald Ballroom, Ballinasloe as part of a Health and Wellbeing event in partnership with Healthy Galway and Galway Rural Development.

The Community Sports Hub is a five-year project funded by Sport Ireland through the Dormant Account Fund. Community Sports Hubs are a collection of progressive sports clubs and other local organisations that want to work together to improve the local opportunities to engage in sport & physical activity. The Hubs provide information, support, and advice on a wide range of sports and physical activities to make it easier for people in disadvantaged areas to engage in a more active lifestyle. Community Sports Hubs aim to increase the number of people of all ages, backgrounds and abilities participating in sport and physical activity within their communities.

#### DORMANT ACCOUNT FUNDING ANNOUNCEMENT

Galway Sports Partnership has been awarded €177,500 through the Dormant Accounts Fund.

From the €177,500 allocation, €77,500 will be directed towards Community Sports Hubs in Ballinasloe and the Active Islands, €90,000 towards Active Cities and €10,000 towards the HER Moves initiative.

This funding is part of a national €5 million Dormant Accounts Fund distributed to Local Sports Partnerships and Active Disability Ireland. It will significantly enhance our efforts to support local volunteers in disadvantaged areas, promote women's participation in sports, and provide inclusive opportunities for individuals with disabilities.

The Dormant Accounts Fund enables unclaimed funds from accounts in credit institutions in Ireland to be used to support the development of persons who are economically or educationally disadvantaged, or those affected by a disability, within the meaning of the Equal Status Act.



# **DIVERGENTLY TOGETHER**

**Divergently Together** a project from the studio of artist Alan James Burns, explores the intersection of disability and the climate emergency across various locations including County Galway. The project was launched this summer in Cavan and is currently in its initial phase of a 2–3-year project. **Augmented Body, Altered Mind** is an interactive exhibition



exploring the climate emergency through the neurodivergent perspective. Visitors are invited to wear a brainwave reading headset that controls the projected visuals, while the accompanying sound features a dialogue between neurodivergent individuals discussing how neurodivergent, non-linear ways of thinking can help with climate action.

The exhibition aims to create intrigue around climate action and foster conversations on how climate change impacts people's lives. The exhibition will take place at Arás Éanna, Inis Oírr, on the 27th and 28th of September and is supported by Galway County Council.



# **CREATIVE IRELAND**

#### **ROUNDSTONE CELEBRATING 200 YEARS**

This year the village of Roundstone celebrates 200 years since its foundation by the Scottish engineer Nimmo. As part of their celebrations, Galway County Council committed Creative Ireland funding for the presentation of three lectures. Hosted in St Mary's Church of Ireland, the series featured talks on topics of local interest from Bill Whelan, Don Thornhill, and Kevin Cronin. The lectures were very well attended as locals and



visitors alike gathered to learn more about the village.

# CREATIVE TECHNOLOGY FOR CHILDREN



Over the past few months, Corrib Kids Coding have been travelling to several libraries across Galway County to deliver their Lego Coding programme. These sessions involved helping the kids to get creative with Lego while also learning the basics of coding and even creating their very own video games. The sessions were booked directly with schools and were all extremely well received. Many of the children have asked for Corrib Kids Coding to run the programme again. The success and smooth running of this project is largely thanks to the library staff, and I would like to take this opportunity to express my sincere gratitude to them. These sessions reached



a total of 500 children and equipped them with skills that are becoming increasingly valuable in today's job market, thus setting them up for a bright, creative future.

# CREATING CONNECTED COMMUNITIES

As part of Galway Rural Development's Social Prescribing Programme, Galway County Council funded a series of creative workshops for service users with complex mental health difficulties. The social prescribing programme aims to support individuals who are isolated and lonely to connect to others through the medium of art. It also provides the opportunity for individuals to identify a new hobby or talent that they can continue to pursue after the course ends. This programme consisted of 4 sessions each in the towns of Athenry, Tuam, and Loughrea, and was run by local artists. These sessions were not open to the public and were specifically for service users of the social prescribing programme. Due to the sensitive and vulnerable nature of this programme's attendants, photography was not permitted at the session.

# YOUTH CONSULTATION ADDITIONAL FUNDING - SELDOM HEARD VOICES

Following on from the success of the Youth Consultation which took place on the Aran Islands this year, the decision was made to apply to Creative Ireland for additional funding to carry out a similar consultation with young people from a seldom heard community. It was decided that the focus of this year's youth consultation would be the Traveller Community. €4,000 of additional funding was secured to carry out this work. A meeting was held with the Galway Traveller Movement who specifically requested that Branar carry out the consultation as they have an innate understanding of the challenges and opportunities presented by working with a minority language, and also an empathy for young people living with a sense of social isolation. The consultation will take place in September 2024 and will inform programming of creative projects and events for children and young people within the Travelling Community of Galway County for 2025.

# **TOURISM**

MILWAUKEE: GALWAY FORGES NEW TOURISM, BUSINESS AND COMMUNITY LINKS IN USA

A Galway delegation comprising representatives of local government, academia, business, and the arts has completed a weeklong promotional visit to the US Midwest.



Delegates from Galway County Council, Galway City Council, ATU Galway City, University of Galway, the Celtic Irish American Academy and Galway Chamber met with government,



tourism, cultural and business leaders across Illinois and Wisconsin.

The visit included a series of meetings in Galway City's sister city of Chicago and Galway County Council's twinning partner Washington County, as well as a tourism showcase at Milwaukee Irish Fest in Wisconsin.

**Councillor Albert Dolan, Cathaoirleach of the County of Galway** said, "This visit provided opportunities to meet with different agencies to learn, exchange, develop and deepen



connections on a wide range of fronts from local government services to tourism and from commerce to community. Comprehensive engagements with the various stakeholders allowed the delegation to explore future collaborations to bring future opportunities to Galway."

During the last week, the delegation met with business and community organisations, including Enterprise Ireland, Chicagoland Chamber of Commerce, 167 Green Street/Fulton Market developers, Chicago Sister Cities International, World Business Chicago, MATTER Chicago and After School Matters.



An alumni event was hosted by the University of Galway in the Irish American Heritage Centre in Chicago, with Illinois-based alumni coming together to network and reflect on their time in Galway City and the University.



Galway County Council delegates travelled to West Bend, the administrative seat of

Washington County, where the 21<sup>st</sup> anniversary of the transatlantic twinning arrangement was celebrated. The delegation also attended at a meeting of the County Board, chaired by Chairman Jeff Schlief, the Chief Executive, and the County Board supervisors.



"Meeting with officials in Washington County provided our delegation with a unique insight into how the vital public services are delivered locally," explained **Councillor Albert Dolan.** 

"Our delegation viewed the Next Generation Housing project, an innovative and unique housing initiative that provides affordable housing where participants availed of the subsidy and agreed to participate in voluntary community activities to repay the equivalent subsidy on the cost of the house," added the Cathaoirleach. "Washington County's Chief Community Development Officer, Jamie Ludovic also gave a presentation on Parks Sustainability, showcasing a self-funding model which benefits the entire community in the pursuit of outdoor recreation."

A highlight of the delegation's trip was its attendance at Milwaukee Irish Fest om the shore



of Lake Michigan at the Henry W. Maier Festival Park. Galway has held an annual presence at the world's largest celebration of Irish/Celtic music and culture for the past 25 years, promoting the county's tourism sector to more than 100,000 festival goers.

According to Liam Conneally, Chief Executive of Galway County Council,

"A key objective of our presence at Milwaukee Irish Fest was to highlight all that Galway has to offer visitors and to increase awareness amongst Americans of the 6 transatlantic services operating between Shannon Airport and Chicago O'Hare, JFK, Boston Logan and Newark international airports. Many US visitors to Ireland are unaware that there is direct access into the West of Ireland where many ultimately wish to holiday. The group also met with various tour operators who have agreed to distribute tourism information relating to Galway with their agents throughout North America."



# THE EU JUST TRANSITION REGENERATIVE TOURISM AND PLACEMAKING SCHEME 2023-2026

The Expression of Interest (EOI) phase for the EU Just Transition Regenerative Tourism and Placemaking Scheme 2023-2026 closed on 2<sup>nd</sup> July 2024 at 12 noon.

The scheme was promoted extensively starting in April, with a comprehensive marketing campaign to raise awareness. Four information evenings were held, with over 100 people attending from the Ballinasloe Municipal District (MD).

Following these sessions, the Tourism Activator conducted 40 face-to-face meetings across the entire Ballinasloe MD. Each application received tailored advice and guidance through the EOI process. If an idea didn't align with the EU Just Transition Fund, applicants were directed to more suitable funding schemes such as the Community Support Scheme, Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme, Clár, Community Recognition Fund, LEADER Funding and others.

In total **25** EOIs were submitted to Failte Ireland for assessment, 13 to date have been approved for application stage. The standard turnaround time for assessment is 6 weeks, with an additional 6 weeks required if further information is needed.

Now that the Expression of Interest deadline has passed, the focus is on preparing full applications, with a submission deadline of 13<sup>th</sup> January 2025. Projects that require planning permission must have it in place before the application submission.

Starting in September, a series of webinars on preparing financial projections using Fáilte Ireland's business plan template has been arranged. These webinars will be led by an experienced accountant and trainer.

The Tourism Activator is scheduling appointments with all eligible applicants to assist with completing the application form.



# CALENDAR OF FESTIVAL & EVENTS 2024



The Tourism Department is dedicated to supporting festivals and participative events by grant funding and promoting a range of events across the County that will provide a great visitor experience and support the social and economic contribution of tourism to the County. In 2024, The Community Support Scheme facilitated festivals and community groups with an overall funding allocation of €87,250. This was co-funded by Galway County Council Community Support Scheme Grants

(€69,250) and Fáilte Ireland Regional Festivals and Events grants valued at €18,000. A total of 61 communities were granted support through this scheme in 2024.

# GUM LITTER TASKFORCE ROADSHOW TAKES TO CO. GALWAY TO TACKLE GUM DISPOSAL.

The Gum Litter Taskforce (GLT) took to the streets of Athenry, Co. Galway today as a part of its Summer Roadshow. The interactive Roadshow



works with local authorities and communities across the country to carry out fun and engaging education and awareness initiatives that demonstrate the proper means of gum disposal and raise awareness of the environmental and fiscal impacts of gum litter. Now in its seventeenth year, the campaign is a collaboration between Food Drink Ireland, the Department of Environment, Climate and Communications, the chewing gum industry, and local authorities.

One in seven people continue to drop their gum on the ground, according to new findings from the Gum Litter Taskforce (GLT), the national awareness campaign which aims to make gum litter an issue of the past. This accounts for 19% of men and 9% of women, showing a higher tendency in men to not properly dispose of their gum.

Attitudes towards gum litter continue to change, as children are educated on the negative environmental and fiscal impacts of gum litter. The GLT 2023 campaign had a positive impact on both attitudes and behaviour regarding gum disposal, with a 5% increase in those reporting 'always' or 'usually' putting their chewed gum in the bin, bringing the figure to a record high of 92%. The latest results of the National Litter Pollution Monitoring report (2022) also reflect this behavioural change, showing a continuous decline of percentage of gum as a proportion of litter at 8.6%.



The GLT research also found that the biggest deterrent of gum litter is peer pressure, however 1 in 4 of state they have changed their behaviour because of the educational messaging from the Bin-it campaign.

The findings highlight the continued impact of the GLT, a joint initiative of the Department of Environment, Climate and Communications, Food Drink Ireland, and the chewing gum industry, which has played a key role in promoting proper gum litter disposal, since its launch in 2007.

Now in its seventeenth year, the GLT campaign travels across the country, working with local authorities to host its Summer Roadshow, which promotes responsible gum disposal by highlighting the environmental impacts of gum and general litter. This is supplemented by the *'Bin It!'* school roadshow and a social media campaign to target 16–24-year-olds. A further positive impact of the campaign is evident from the 16% of young people who reported having stopped the habit of 'dropping or spitting' gum recently post campaign.

Supporting the Roadshow in Co. Galway, the Cathaoirleach of the County of Galway, Cllr. Albert Dolan said: The Gum Litter Taskforce Roadshow is an important reminder to the whole community that we must continue to reduce our litter and protect our local environment."

Welcoming the Roadshow to Galway, Deputy Chief Executive of Galway County Council, Mr. Uinsinn Finn said: "We are delighted to welcome back the Gum Litter Taskforce to Galway. The Roadshow is an excellent opportunity to educate the public on the benefits of responsibly disposing of gum litter and to encourage positive, sustainable behaviour." The Director of Services Rural and Community Development, Integration and Environment, Ms. Jacqueline Carroll said, "Galway County Council is delighted to support The Gum Litter Taskforce Campaign. The reduction of gum litter in recent years is a testament to the success of the campaign, and we look forward to seeing the progressive positive change the campaign brings in years to come."

Gum Litter Taskforce Executive, Avril Donlon of Food Drink Ireland said: "We are delighted to launch the 2024 Gum Litter Taskforce campaign, with the support of the Department of Environment, Climate and Communications, today in Dublin. The results of the campaign are evident, and we are thrilled that 1 in 4 people state the GLT campaign as the reason for deterring them from littering gum. Last year we delivered significant results, with a record number of schools participating in the Bin It! Education programme, and we really look forward to what the 2024 campaign has in store."

Katrine Grytter, Corporate Affairs Director, Mars Wrigley Northern Europe, and Ireland said: We are very proud of the continued success of Gum Litter Taskforce campaign at Mars Wrigley and delighted with the continued support from the Department of Environment, Climate and Communications and Food Drink Ireland. The campaign helps to teach younger generations about the negative impacts of gum and other litter and promotes an eco-



conscious mindset. We look forward to the continued success of GLT campaign and its supporting bodies in 2024."

This year's campaign will see representatives from the Gum Litter Taskforce working with local authorities and communities to carry out education and awareness initiatives that demonstrate the proper means of gum disposal and raise awareness of the environmental and fiscal impacts of improper disposal.

Then, in September, the Gum Litter Taskforce's *Bin It!* education programme will travel across the country and deliver 60 performances a year to primary and secondary schools nationwide, with the ambition to visit 180 schools by 2025. This is in addition to useful lesson plan material that is given to the schools.

The Anti-Litter Ambassador programme was launched in May 2024. We had started our campaign to sign up ambassadors and integrate the programme into our Anti-litter programmes and events. The Galway County Council Anti-Litter Ambassador Programme presents a pro-active and non-confrontational way for individuals, groups, communities, and businesses to declare their support for a litter-free county.

Under the new initiative, Anti-Litter Ambassadors will sign a pledge committing not to litter and to participating in the numerous anti-litter initiatives supported by Galway County Council. This includes National Spring Clean, the Gum Litter Campaign, Dog Fouling Campaign, and the Picker Pals programme.



# VETERINARY DEPARTMENT

#### **FOOD SAFETY**

On 24<sup>th</sup> July a joint memo for Government was made on behalf of DAFM and the Department of Health regarding a phased transfer of official food controls from the Local Authority Veterinary Services to the Department of Agriculture, Food, and the Marine (DAFM).

The Government have agreed on a permanent transfer of funding from the Department of Health to DAFM along with the transfer of relevant staff resources from local authorities.

A steering group and a working group comprising representation from the various departments are developing an agreed work programme on the phased transfer, with the aim of having the transfer completed in quarter four, 2024.

To date in 2024, **665** bovines, **4,022** ovines, and **92** poultry have been processed through local abattoirs.



# DOG CONTROL

In July 2024, The Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD announced a ban on XL Bully breed Dogs. From October 1st, 2024, new regulations will prohibit the importing, breeding, selling, and re-homing of XL Bullies. A new system of certification for existing owners of XL Bully dogs will be put in place and over the period 1st October 2024 to 1st February 2025 all existing XL Bully owners will have to apply for a Certificate of Exemption. Certificates of Exemption will be issued subject to strict criteria, including a requirement for licensing, microchipping, and neutering.

Other possible criteria are being developed by the Stakeholder Group on Dog Control, which is placed to advise on these issues. After 1st February 2025, any owner not compliant with the new regulations will have their dog seized and euthanized. Training programmes have been organised for local authority dog wardens and Veterinary personnel on identification of XL Bully Type Dogs with training for relevant Galway County Council Staff scheduled for October 2024.

The Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD, the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien TD, and Minister of State with Responsibility for Local Government and Planning, Alan Dillon TD announced funding of €2 million in July 2024 for local authorities to support the resourcing of dog warden services from 2025. The funding recognises the increased demands in dog control and the need to ensure resources on the ground to enforce the pending ban on XL Bully dogs. Galway County Council have begun seeking to progress additional resources with the Department. The Minister has also allocated an additional €2 million in capital funding to local authorities to expand and improve warden and shelter facilities. This funding is in addition to the monies received by local authorities in respect of capital funding for upgraded works to shelter and warden equipment in November 2023.

1397 dog licenses were purchased from 1<sup>st</sup> July to August 26th, 443 of which were purchased online with the balance purchased through the local post office.

9 fixed penalty notices were issued to dog owners in July and August for offences under the

Control of Dogs Act 1986.

#### WATER QUALITY AND ENFORCEMENT

# NATIONAL INSPECTION PLAN

We carried out follow-up calls on 87 domestic wastewater treatment systems that were inspected in July. This included issuing compliance certs and advisory notices. Many systems only needed to be de-sludge, and a good portion of the advisory notices were closed off after evidence for de-sludging was submitted. A few proposals were also submitted to rectify more serious issues, and these are being worked through. Files are being prepared at present for our law agents in relation to advisory notices from previous years that have not been complied with.



Verification inspections also took place at a few properties to check works carried out to comply with notices. All these inspections complied with the advisory notices and compliance certs were issued and files closed out.

#### **COMPLAINTS**

A Section 12 notice was issued to a business premises in Inisboffin after a number of complaints were received in relation to an uncontrolled discharge of wastewater. There are also on-going issues in relation to wastewater at an adjoining property but there has been engagement from the owners with some works completed and more works planned. An inspection was carried out of a newly installed treatment system for a domestic house after on-going complaints in relation to the previous older system. The complainant claimed that the new system was not as per the planning permission and that there was still effluent flowing out onto the public road. The inspection verified that in fact planning permission was complied with. In addition, no evidence was found of untreated effluent flowing out onto public roads. This complaint is therefore closed.

#### **BATHING WATERS**

A Bathing Prohibition Notice was placed on Traught Beach, Kinvara on the 23<sup>rd of</sup> August due to elevated levels of bacteria in water samples. This has been attributed to heavy rainfall in the lead up to sampling. Re-samples were taken on the 21<sup>st</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> August. The notice was



lifted on the 26th of August as bacteria levels had reduced to safe levels.

#### NATIONAL AGRICULTURAL INSPECTIONS PROGRAMME

Planning for agricultural inspections in waterbodies where water quality needs to be protected and in areas where water quality is at risk has commenced. The Environmental Protection Agency requires that Galway County Council carry out at least 38 planned inspections in 2024 under the Good Agricultural Practice Regulations.

# WASTE/AIR MANAGEMENT AND ENFORCEMENT

We received a report that a 20 ft sailing boat had run aground in Renville. Initial investigations determined that there was no risk of oil pollution. Locals are removing any

loose waste, ropes, and nets etc. Investigation is ongoing into the ownership details. The intention is to serve notice to remove the wreck.

We inspected 2 construction sites for Article 27 by product applications.

Staff attended an online webinar hosted by the EPA relating to the publication of the National by Product Criteria for Greenfield Soil and Stone.



# VALIDATION OF ANNUAL WASTE RETURNS

Validation of waste returns ongoing - 90% complete.

#### ANTI-DUMPING INITIATIVE UPDATE

- 1. CCTV equipment ongoing
- **2. Bulky goods collections**. Collections ran for 4 weeks at the 3 civic amenity centers and the Barna Recycling Facility. 2 additional 1-day collections are planned for Loughrea and Gort Marts. This will be organised for September.
- **3.** Clean up Ballinasloe. For the second year in a row, we were unable to clean the site that this project was intended for. This was due to Health and Safety concerns. Instead, the funds were used to clean up other illegal dump sites in the area.
- **4. Anti-litter radio advertisements.** These are running until the end of September.
- **5. School Uniform Reuse.** This took place a few weeks ago in 2 schools in Loughrea. Used clean uniforms were collected on one day and a pop up 'shop' was set up to distribute the uniforms. It was extremely successful.
- **6. Clean up for Tuam**. We completed clean ups in separate areas where illegal dumping was identified.



- 7. Clean up Abbey Bog Large amount of waste was removed from Abbeyknockmoy Bog.
- **8.** Bulky Goods Inishboffin not started yet.
- 9. CCTV Signage ongoing

#### **CCTV**

Work has commenced on the Data Protection Impact Assessment (DPIA) that will cover all the Environment CCTV sites going forward. This DPIA should be in Quarter 4.







#### WATER SAFETY PROGRAMME

This year the Water Safety Programme involved the recruitment of a panel of over 50 trained lifeguards to provide services at nine locations in the county and six locations in the



city as part of a Shared Service Agreement with Galway City Council. Two lifeguards are provided at all beaches in compliance with International Lifesaving Federation of Europe (ILSE). This season the Lifeguards started on the 1<sup>st</sup> of June and finished on 8<sup>th</sup> of September. City and County Beaches operated between 11 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Galway County Council supported Water Safety Weeks in Inis Óirr, Loughrea and Portumna this year with the assistance of the lifeguards and the Water Safety Awareness & Development Officer.

The role of the Water Safety Awareness & Development Officer includes supervision of the Water Safety Lifeguard Programme, development of the service as well as advising both local authorities on all aspects of water safety and implementation of the guidance notes.

Galway County Council make a yearly contribution to Water Safety Ireland of €6,000. Galway County Council actively supports the work of the Galway Water Safety Area Committee through the WSADO.



New lifeguard huts were installed in Loughrea, Portumna, An Trá Mór Indreabhán and An Cheathru Rua. Beach-friendly wheelchairs are available from the lifeguard huts for people with mobility issues at Tracht Beach, Kinvara, An Trá Mór, Indreabhán and An Spidéal Pier.

## **IRISH**

The Padraig Pearse school will take place on the 26<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup> September in Ionad Cultúrtha An Phiarsaigh in Ros Muc, Conamara, Co. Galway.

On Friday the 27<sup>th</sup> September presentations and information will be given regarding Enterprise in the Gaeltacht where the LEO office, Údarás na Gaeltachta and Dr. Fionnbarra Ó Brollcháin will give information about developing an idea and how to bring to the market and the importance of Irish branding. There will be representatives from small enterprises giving information on their own experiences. The event will finish on Friday afternoon with a Mindfulness workshop by Marian Ní Chonghaile.

## LIBRARY SERVICES

#### **ARCHIVES**



With the completion of the phased digitisation of the important and valuable archive collection for the Galway Board of Guardians (GPL6/) Galway County Council Archives has, with the assistance of IT, had the surviving volumes dating from 1889-1921 uploaded and made available on the <a href="Digital Archive">Digital Archive</a>. The complete collection, comprised of over 144 volumes, is now freely

accessible to researchers at home and aboard, facilitating exploration into the history of the Galway workhouse, the Famine, social conditions, and the impact of political changes over a period spanning 1839-1921, and seek possible family history connections

Galway Public Libraries' fine exhibition *Celebrating a Century,* a celebration of one of the county's most valued public services, was on display in Áras an Chontae, Galway from 25<sup>th</sup> July to 9<sup>th</sup> August.

From the exhibition we learn that the popular Schools service was established in 1964 and now visits over 220 national schools twice annually, we learn that the oldest book in the Local Studies section dates from 1689, while the oldest record in the Archives is from 1606.

The amazing array of activities and facilities available in the 29 branches



in the county, including on the islands, is clear to see through the exhibition, from a monthly music session in Tuam to the Tovertafel Table in Ballybane, to Lego time and Ciorcal Comhrá (Irish language chat) gatherings in Portumna, and extended self-service access via My Open



Library in Ballinasloe. Together with the many online resources, public computers, printing services and much more available in branches from Oranmore to Inishbofin, and from Dunmore to Clifden, there really is something for everyone at the local library.

## RIGHT TO READ

#### SUMMER STARS

Galway Public Libraries' 29 branches, mobile library and schools' van hosted a full programme of events for children over the summer months. Events ranged from quilling workshops to a visit by a barn owl, and from tie-dyeing t-shirts to Irish language craft and storytimes. Approximately 3000 children signed up for the Summer Reading Challenge, helping to maintain their reading levels during the holidays.

Each library branch hosts a celebratory party to mark the children's reading achievement. The celebrations in Galway County libraries are attended by the Cathaoirleach or his deputy and the Mayor of the City of Galway or a deputy attends the Summer Stars parties in the three city branches.

## CULTURE NIGHT- SEPTEMBER 20

Culture Night is a national festival which celebrates culture, creativity, and the arts in Ireland. The festival takes place annually in September.

Culture Night events take place in many of the city and county library branches. Westside Library is hosting a discussion on literature and reading featuring acclaimed poet Emily Cullen and award-winning author Elizabeth Reapy. Julie Anne de Brún is hosting an Irish language storytime and music session for children.

Ballybane Library patrons will be serenaded by a string quartet and Galway City Library is hosting an evening of poetry readings.

Tuam Library is organizing an event to celebrate Tuam's language and identity. Participants will learn about Tuam and Traveller Culture, using embroidery to embellish Traveller Beady Pockets, and their history and significance will be explored. There will be a printmaking and fabric painting table, where bags will be decorated with Tuam's unique languages.

'Monsters and Things' will be performed in Ballinasloe Library. The show is a blend of farce, puppetry and storytelling which aims to spark children's imagination.

### AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Galway County Council is inviting the public to participate in an online survey as part of its efforts to establish the level of interest and preferred locations in County Galway for affordable homes. An affordable housing scheme provides houses at a reduced price for eligible applicants, including First Time Buyers and Fresh Start Buyers, in areas where there is an identified housing demand and an affordability constraint. The survey will inform its ongoing work of developing affordable housing across the County, in accordance with 'Housing for All Delivery Action Plan 2022-2026'.



The survey can be viewed and completed on the Galway County Council website at www.galway.ie/affordablesurvey.

The survey will be open for 4 weeks from September 4<sup>th</sup> to October 4th. Details of the survey have been promoted in print and social media, online and radio.

## CHOICE BASED LETTING

What is Choice Based Letting (CBL)?

Choice Based Letting (CBL) is a method we use to allocate council houses and is part of the Social Housing Strategy 2020. This method should be used by approved applicants only. Choice-based letting (CBL) is a method that can be used for the allocation of social housing where an applicant can express their interest in renting a suitable property in their preferred area.





There are currently three properties available on our website Choice Based Letting (galway.ie)



## Who can use CBL?

This method can be used by approved applicants only. Approved applicants are people that are already on our Housing waiting list.

## Are all Galway County Council houses part of CBL?

The scheme only applies to dwellings which have been specifically designated by Galway County Council for Choice Based Letting.

## How can households apply for a property which has been advertised?

Households that wish to be considered in the allocation of a dwelling must, within a specified timeframe to apply to Galway County Council by submitting their interest via the online CBL system and supply any supporting information specified in the notice. Each notice advertising a property will set out any specific application requirements for a particular dwelling.

## What happens if I refuse an offer for a CBL house?

If you refuse the offer you will remain on our Housing list, but we will not accept another CBL request from you for a period of one year.

## Can I register for more than one house at a time?

Yes, provided you have not refused a CBL offer in the past year.

## How to use CBL?

To register your interest in living in a CBL house browse the houses on this mini web site and follow the on-screen instructions. You will need your PPS number and an email address to complete the registration.

You will need your PPS number and an email address to complete the registration.

Since the relaunch in July 2024 18 properties have been advertised to date. These properties are being processed through the Allocations Unit in accordance with our Allocation Policy. 577 people registered their interest of which 51 were from the Homeless category.



#### To date of the 18 advertised:

- 3 are currently being advertised,
- 2 have been occupied,
- 1 is in the final stage of allocation and;
- 12 are being processed through the application process.



## **VACANT SOCIAL HOUSING UNITS**

Galway County Council has 99 vacant units between Local Authority and Approved Housing Body units. 24 of there are under repair, 26 are derelict, 11 are undergoing major refurbishment, 24 are currently being allocated and 14 are under offer.

## CROI CONAITHE

The Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant is available for the refurbishment of vacant or derelict properties for occupation as a principle private residence and for properties that will be made available for long-term rent. This includes the conversion of commercial or public use buildings that have not been used as residential heretofore. These buildings must be compliant with Planning (i.e., exempt or with planning permission). Agricultural structures, e.g., sheds and outhouses, are not eligible for grant funding.

There continues to be a high level of interest in the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grants (Croí Cónaithe Scheme). The number of applications submitted to date is 444 (49 in progress i.e. additional information has been requested, etc., 296 applications have been finalised (274 approved and 22 rejected), 94 applications have been withdrawn, and 5 Vacant Property



Refurbishment Grants have been drawn down by applicants.

#### SALE OF DERELICT SOCIAL HOUING STOCK

There are several former social houses in the ownership of GCC that are deemed to be derelict and because of issues such as access, services, extremely rural location, and lack of demand, it is considered that these are not viable to return to social housing.

**Tranche 1 Update** - 11 properties were advertised for sale in **October 2023** – advertised in Local press (Connacht tribune and Galway City Tribune, social media, auctioneers' website, property websites, notices at properties):

- 8 properties were presented at the December Council meeting for disposal by section 183 approved at meeting.
- 1 property was presented at the April Council meeting for disposal by Section 183 –
   approved at meeting.
- 1 property is sale agreed **pending** approval for disposal by Section 183 at the next full council meeting.
- 1 property still open to offers.

Of the 10 properties sale agreed:

- 1 property is sale closed.
- 8 properties are in conveyancing.
- 1 Property is sale agreed pending approval by Section 183.



**Tranche 2 Update** - 6 derelict/redundant housing properties were identified and advertised for sale in **August 2024** - advertised in Local press (Connacht Tribune and Galway City Tribune, social media, auctioneers' website, property websites, notices at properties).

- 2 Properties are sale agreed pending approval for disposal by section 183.

#### HOUSING LOANS

## LOCAL AUTHORITY HOME LOAN

The Local Authority Home Loan was launched in January 2022 as part of Housing for All. It supports creditworthy borrowers who are unable to get finance from commercial banks to buy a home. It can be used for new, second hand or self-build homes. It means those on more moderate incomes are helped by the State to achieve homeownership. This Loan scheme replaced the previous Home Loan scheme under Rebuilding Ireland. Under the LAHL scheme, the prices of homes eligible for a Local Authority Home Loan and income limits of those eligible to apply for a loan were increased.

Under the Local Authority Home Loan Scheme, 30 applications have been received so far in 2024, 24 were approved in principle and 6 were refused. At the end of August 6 loans to the amount of €603,900 have been drawn down. There were also 14.8 (live) loans in 2024 in the amount of €2,621,204 which had been approved in principle in 2023 with €1,085,453 drawn down in 2024. In addition, €75,200 for 0.65 of a loan which had been approved in principle in 2022 is drawdown to date in 2024 with 0.19 remaining to be drawn down. Please note that fractions of a loan refer to loans for self builds which are being drawn down in stages.

## LOCAL AUTHORITY PURCHASE AND RENOVATION LOAN

The Local Authority Purchase and Renovation Loan, launched in June 2024, is a Government backed mortgage and loan for the purchase and renovation of a derelict or uninhabitable homes. The loan is available to first-time buyers and "fresh start" applicants who have been unable to get funding from commercial lenders. It is an extension of the Local Authority Home Loan.

The applicant must qualify for the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant to get this loan. The Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant is a payment an applicant can get if they are turning a vacant house or building into their permanent home or a rental property. A grant of up to €50,000 is available. If the refurbishment costs exceed the standard grant of up to €50,000, a top-up grant amount of up to €20,000 is available.


## HOUSING MAINTENANCE

The Housing Maintenance Team are responsible for the maintenance and repair of the Council's Social Housing stock. This currently consists of 3018 housing units across the county. Works are carried out by the three housing maintenance crews plus contractors. Works include the day-to-day reactive maintenance, planned maintenance and the refurbishment of void units.

#### REACTIVE MAINTENANCE

Reactive maintenance deals with the day-to-day issues reported by tenants via the council app or on the council's website. These are assessed initially by the Housing Technicians and work orders issued for items deemed to be the responsibility of the Council. Up to the end of August this year, 2863 repair requests have been logged with the Maintenance Team. Of these, 1250 have been sanctioned for repair. During the same period 1039 sanctioned repairs have been closed out.

The chart below shows the breakdown by category of the various repair requests received. As can be see Plumbing & Heating is the most requested category at 40% followed by Electrical at 13%



### PLANNED MAINTENANCE

The Housing Maintenance Team also have a substantial Planned Maintenance Works Programme underway. Works include the testing of the electrical installation in all houses over 10 years old. Any issues identified are repaired and the installation is then certified. In addition, new fire and carbon monoxide detection systems are installed to comply with the current building regulations standard.



This programme has resulted in a substantial reduction in the number of repair requests for electrical issues.

The Maintenance Team are also rolling out the annual servicing of heat pump heating systems installed in newer and retrofitted houses. This is a specialist area and must be carried out by approved technicians to maintain manufacturer's warranties. There are currently 318 heat pumps serviced to date in 2024 with many more coming on stream once the original installer's defects period has expired.


## **VOID MANAGEMENT**

The Housing Maintenance Team are also responsible for the repair and refurbishment of social



housing units once they become vacant. This is a particular area of focus to that housing units are made available for re-letting in as short a time as possible. These works are carried out by both inhouse maintenance crews and outside contractors. To date this year 56 houses have become vacant and during the same period 60 units were refurbished and made available for letting. There are currently 24 units vacant at various stages of refurbishment. See photos below of a house in Loughrea that was fully refurbished earlier this year.











## TRAVELLER ACCOMMODATION

Galway County Council has responsibility for a housing stock of 80 properties designated as Traveller Specific Accommodation along with 14 halting site bays and 2 bays within a Traveller Group Housing Scheme.

The Council is currently preparing their sixth Traveller Accommodation Programme 2025 – 2029, in accordance with the direction of the Minister of State for Planning and Local Government. Following consultation with eligible housing applicants, including transfer applicants and relevant stakeholders, the plan has been prepared and is available for public inspection. The latest date for receipt of written submissions on the Draft Programme is Friday 13<sup>th</sup> September 2024. Submissions can be made to <a href="mailto:travelleraccommodationunit@galwaycoco.ie">travelleraccommodationunit@galwaycoco.ie</a> or via ordinary post to the Traveller Accommodation Unit, Housing Department, Galway County Council.

A planned programme of major refurbishment works commenced on Traveller Specific Accommodation in 2020, following successful funding applications to the Traveller Accommodation Unit of the Department of Housing. To date 18 properties have undergone major refurbishment and extension based on the needs of the households. An additional 9 properties have been added to the stock designated as Traveller Specific Accommodation, including the direct build of a new Traveller Specific Group Scheme of 6 houses and 2 bays in Craughwell.

The major refurbishment of 13 houses in the Traveller Specific Group Scheme in Ballygar is ongoing with an anticipated completion date of

October 2024. The final house in Ballygar is to be reconstructed as it had to be demolished following a fire. Works are nearing completion on a further 5 Traveller specific properties, including an extension to 2 of them to meet the specific needs of family members. A funding application to refurbish a further 2 properties has been successful and tender documentation is currently being prepared to progress same.

It is anticipated that, on the completion of the next Traveller Accommodation Programme that all 80 properties will have undergone significant improvement and adaptation works depending on the needs of the households.

#### **HOMELESSNESS**

Homelessness has unfortunately reached another record high with 14,303 individuals recorded as accessing emergency accommodation nationally in June 2024. The increasing lack of availability of affordable rental properties which can be funded under the HAP scheme is particularly concerning.

The current status of people recorded as accessing and awaiting access to homeless services with a centre of interest in Galway County is as follows:

These numbers can and do change daily as people's circumstances change. The Private Emergency Accommodation, which is all located in Galway City is sourced by COPE Galway with the household receiving support from them to enable them to progress to more stable accommodation. This accommodation is a joint service availed of by both Galway City and County Councils.

## **COLD WEATHER RESPONSE**

Galway County Council is seeking expressions of interest from Non-Governmental Organisations (NGOs) who are interested in providing a Cold Weather Response service (emergency short-term accommodation) in County Galway, from October 2024 to March 2025, at a property provided by Galway County Council.

Short-term emergency accommodation is necessary for people who have a history of rough sleeping and is particularly in demand during the Winter period. It is the intention to have sufficient emergency accommodation beds available to provide a bed in a safe, secure place for persons who are homeless and at risk of having to rough sleep. The Cold Weather Response is targeted at individuals who require short-term emergency accommodation and need additional supports to enable them to successfully access same. Section 10 homeless funding will be required from the Department of Housing to enable the Council to provide the service.

## NEW PROPOSAL FOR CO-LOCATION OF COLD WEATHER RESPONSE AND MEDIUM TERM SUPPORTED ACCOMMODATION

There is an acknowledgement in the Housing for All – A New Plan for Ireland, published in September 2021, of a need to provide appropriate supported emergency accommodation to the most vulnerable socially excluded member of society who have complex needs and are experiencing homelessness. Pathway 2 of Housing for All places an emphasis on the development of emergency accommodation through Local Authority or AHB owned facilities for those who are homeless.

Galway County Council has identified a need to provide supported accommodation in the County of Galway for vulnerable people experiencing chronic homelessness. Short-term accommodation is necessary for people who have a history of rough sleeping and is particularly in demand during the Winter period. The provision of medium-term accommodation that is accessible is essential to provide for persons complex, multiple issues, particularly those with a dual diagnosis of mental health and addiction issues.



A proposal has been prepared following consultation with relevant stakeholders and discussion is ongoing regarding it with the Department of Housing.

#### NEW INITIATIVE - SUPPORTED HOUSING FOR FAMILIES

A pilot programme has been established in Galway County and City and includes the collaboration of the Department of Housing, Galway County and City Councils, Health Services Executive, TUSLA and Non-Governmental Organisations. It involves the provision of supported housing for families with complex needs. This multi-agency approach of this service aims to provide appropriate services to families who are entrenched in homelessness, are long-term residing in Private Emergency Accommodation or have had repeated stays in Private Emergency Accommodation having been unable to sustain a tenancy.

Two properties and families in each of Galway County have been identified as suitable for this pilot programme and the two families will occupy the properties in the coming weeks. One of the properties underwent extension and major refurbishment with the support of Traveller Accommodation Funding.

#### CAPITAL BUILD PROGRAMME

## PART 8 BARKHILL, WOODFORD

A Part 8 planning application was submitted on 19<sup>th</sup> July 2024 for the demolition of existing dwelling and outbuildings and the construction of 2no. 2-bedroom dwellings, together with connections to existing public services, including all other ancillary site works and services at Barkhill, Woodford, Co Galway.

The consultation period concluded on 2nd September 2024. One submission was received on 2<sup>nd</sup> September from the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage recommending resistance of demolition of the existing on-site structures together with a comprehensive wildlife survey.

The Planning Department and Conservation Officer will be consulted to determine how best to proceed with this project.

#### SECTION 179A MOYLOUGH

A combined Stage 1 and 2 funding application has been approved by the Department of Housing Local Government and Heritage under 'SHIP Construction Renewal' for renovation of existing townhouses in Moylough village to provide 4 new housing units comprising of 2 no. 3 bed x 2-storey terrace units and 2 no. 2 bed apartment units.

This proposal represents an ideal infill opportunity within the village confines of the 50 kph speed limit zones whilst the land benefits from direct access onto the R360.



A Section 179A was published on the 26<sup>th</sup>July 2024 and will conclude on 23<sup>rd</sup> September 2024. Members of the Ballinasloe M.D were provided with formal notification of the proposed Section 179A on 22<sup>nd</sup> July 2024.

#### HILLCREST AND PARKMORE DT TENDER AWARD

The design team tender process for Hillcrest and Parkmore infill developments concluded on 3rd July 2024 with the return of one tender from the Architect Led Integrated Design Team Framework. The tender assessment concluded that the fees submitted were abnormally high and the tender competition was cancelled.

The projects were awarded to Vincent Hannon Architects as an extension to a current appointment to provide integrated design team services for delivery of the Hillcrest and Parkmore infill development.

## PHYSICAL INFRASTRUCTURE, FIRE & EMERGENCY & CLIMATE CHANGE

#### PHYSICAL INFRASTRUCTUE

## LOCAL ROADS SPEED LIMITS

The implementation of the recommendations contained in the 2023 Department of Transport publication "Speed Limit Review" has commenced. Provision was made for the associated changes in the Road Traffic Act, 2024.

A phased approach to the implementation has been directed, with the change in the default speed limit on Local Roads from 80kph to 60kph being the first part.

The background to, and implications of, this proposed change has been presented to each of the Municipal Districts. Feedback has been taken and will be considered in the preparation of the draft Bye Laws. As per the statutory process for the making of Special Speed Limit Bye Laws the next steps are to engage with An Garda Siochana and undertake a public consultation.

The public consultation period is confirmed as 30 days. Following the conclusion of that process, and consideration of all submissions received, the final bye laws will be brought to the plenary meeting of Galway County Council for adoption.

It is also the intention, at that time, to bring forward supplementary draft bye laws for a select number of schools on National Roads and proceed with the statutorily prescribed steps, such as consultation with An Gardai Siochana and the public and to bring draft bye-laws to council for consideration.

On completion of the implementation of the recommendations from the "Speed Limit Review", as per the nationally mandated timetable, a full county wide review of speed limits will be undertaken.



# GALWAY COUNTY COUNCIL PROJECT SHORTLISTED FOR AGE-FRIENDLY IRELAND AWARDS

Galway County Council is pleased to have been shortlisted for recognition at our National Age Friendly Recognition & Achievement Awards.

The project involved the installation of bus shelters serving rural areas in Conamara at Casla and Indreabhán, and the shelters are located adjacent to community facilities.

The project was designed and managed by the An Cheathrú Rua Area Office team (Roads),



supported by the local Conamara Councillors, with construction by Padraig Folan Civil Engineering.

The awards ceremony will be in November.



#### **BROADBAND UPDATE**

Galway County Council is excited to share the news that Open Eir's high-speed fibre network now reaches over 70,000 premises across 90 towns and villages across Galway, including Cor an Dola, An Spidéal, and Baile Chláir. Once Open Eir's roll-out program is complete it is



projected to bring high-speed broadband to 104,860 homes and businesses in Co. Galway. Additional works are planned for several towns including Ballinasloe, Kinvara, Loughrea, Miltown, Oranmore, Portumna and Turloughmore over the next six months. This state-of-the-art fibre network will enhance digital access and connect communities across Galway and Ireland.





# Noel Madden, Broadband Officer for Galway County Council: "The

implementation of a future-proofed fibre network is essential for Galway, ensuring seamless digital connectivity and empowering our communities to thrive in an increasingly digital world. As Broadband Officer for Galway County Council our collaboration with Open Eir is pivotal in this shared effort. By working closely with

Open Eir, we are leveraging their expertise and extensive network to deliver high-speed broadband to every corner of our county."

#### COMMUNITY WARDEN UPDATE

Last month Galway County Council Community Warden Service received 4 of 16 new vans ordered for the service. These vans are Ford Courier vans supplied by Claffey's in Portumna

and come with a high spec including heated seats, heated steering wheels, conditioning, driver assistance and have LED Flashing lights front and back. They are fully branded with GCC Logo and have messages regarding illegal dumping on the back. By the end of September, we will have received the remainder of the vans.

## NATIONAL ROADS PROJECT OFFICE (NRPO)

## CONNAMARA GREENWAY - CLIFDEN TO OUGHTERARD

Development consent for the Clifden to Oughterard Greenway was approved in 2013 by An Bord Pleanála with Galway County Council's intention that the necessary lands would be acquired by agreement. With agreement reached with many of the affected landowner the NRPO have prepared and applied to An Bord Pleanála for confirmation of a Compulsory Purchase Order for lands where agreement could not be reached. The CPO application was submitted to the Board on 22<sup>nd</sup> July 2024 and 10 no submissions were received from affected landowners. The Board have indicated that the case is due for decision Q1 2025.

# ACTIVE TRAVEL PROGRAMME – ACTIVE TRAVEL FOOTPATH AND INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

## MEETING WITH THE NATIONAL TRANSPORT AUTHORITY

At the July Plenary Meeting, the members requested an update from the National Transport Authority (NTA). Following this, a formal request was submitted to the NTA for their attendance at a meeting with Galway County Council. The NTA has since confirmed their willingness to participate in a workshop with the Councillors. This proposal will be discussed at the CPG Meeting scheduled for Monday, 16th September.

## **ACTIVE TRAVEL PROJECTS**

Galway County Council Active Travel team, with funding from the National Transport Authority Active Travel Investment Team, continues to develop and progress a number of Active Travel Design Schemes. Some notable project milestones were met during August 2024.

- 1. Active Travel Design Projects gone to tender:
- GCO/23/0021 Tuam Active Travel Schemes Design The Design Brief has been approved by the NTA. This project was released on eTenders on 01/08/2024. The Tender closing date is 13/09/2024.
- GCO/24/0002 Athenry Active Travel Schemes Design The Design Brief has been approved by the NTA. This project was released on eTenders on 01/08/2024.
   The Tender closing date is 13/09/2024.



# 2. Safe Routes to School (SRTS)

The NTA has funded Galway County Council to deliver a comprehensive Safe Routes To Schools programme across the County. It is intended to design and implement a



series of road safety measures, in line with SRTS Design Guidelines, to better promote road safety for students walking and cycling to school.

# Safe Routes to School Tii Pilot Scheme- N59 Scoil Bhaile Nua, Maigh Cuilinn

Scoil Bhaile Nua, a Primary School located 3km Northwest of Maigh Cuilinn on N59 was chosen as one of three schools in the Country to participate in a National Pilot scheme for

schools located on highspeed roads. The
successful delivery of the
project was a
collaborative effort by
Galway CoCo, NTA, An
Taisce and Tii who funded
the scheme. It is the first
of many future schools in
Galway to receive Safe
Routes to School
measures which are
primarily aimed at



implementing safer conditions for students attending school and includes promotion of walking and cycling as an alternative mode of transport.

The design was completed by Galway County Council and following approval, works were completed by Harrington Concrete & Quarries Unlimited on 23<sup>rd</sup> Aug 2024. Upon return to the 2024/25 academic year, the School Principal welcomed the scheme and has acknowledged the positive change to the school environs.

Measures introduced at Scoil Bhaile Nua as part of this Pilot include:

- Definition of a School Zone/ Gateway by means of Safe Routes to School Signage and anti-skid surfacing on both approaches to the school.
- Implementation of staggered "Sharks Teeth" road markings on the approach lane to the school from both directions to increase driver awareness and slow traffic down adjacent to the school.
- Introduction of multicolored pencil bollards along a section of the footpath to make the school more identifiable to vehicles passing the location and to prevent illegal parking of the footpath thus enhancing the safety for pedestrians.

# **GALWAY PARTNER FOREST PROGRAMME**







Galway County Council is involved in international programme aimed at sequestering carbon through partnerships with communities who are successfully conserving tropical forests. have partnered with We ATU Connemara, WoodConnect - Ireland's wood industry cluster, Pilot Projects, and Greenville Procurement **Partners** as part Cities4Forests Partner Forest Programme through which partners are invited to source tropical hardwood from exemplary community forest conservation enterprises to be used in prominent

public infrastructure.

Items of street furniture produced by ATU Connemara's School of Design & Creative Arts as part of the project are being installed at various locations throughout the town of Clifden. A number of pieces are also on exhibition at Áras an Chontae in Galway City.

A number of students had the opportunity to visit the Guatemalan community forests of Uaxactún and Carmelita, which collectively protect 320,000 acres of rainforest, as part of their delivery of the project.



As part of the initiative, the project partners are co-creating a green and sustainable purchasing policy for wood in furniture and construction in County Galway. Links to media coverage below:

#### COMMUNITY CLIMATE ACTION

#### COMMUNITY CLIMATE ACTION FUND

Galway County Council received 55 applications under the Community Climate Action Fund. The projects covered a broad range including upgrades and solar panels for community buildings, bike shelters, water refilling stations, community allotments and swap shops. Following a detailed review 32 projects were recommended to the Department of the Environment, Climate and Communications. The Department approved the 32 projects, and the Climate Unit is now liaising with the relevant communities with a view to commencing contracts this month. Communities will have 18 months to complete their projects. The Climate Unit will continue to work with other communities to support future applications.

# CRUINNIU NA MBÁD

The Climate Unit and Environment Section were delighted to partner with Cuan Beo as part of Cruinniu na mBád on the 14<sup>th</sup> of August. As well as having our own stand highlighting the actions that individuals can take in the areas of circular economy, waste reduction, water conservation and energy reduction we gave a presentation highlighting the elements of a successful application under the Community Climate Action Fund as part of the Environmental Groups Community Forum.

# WATER SERVICES

# CAPITAL PROGRAMME

#### **UISCE EIREANN WORKSHOP**

At the request of members, Uisce Éireann will host a Water Services Workshop in the Council Chamber on the 7<sup>th</sup> October at 2pm. The workshop will provide an opportunity for Uisce Éireann to update members on their plans and to answer any questions you may have about water services and investment plans. An invite will be issued from Uisce Eireann directly to members.

# ATHENRY WASTEWATER NETWORK

Coffey Construction commenced works in January 2023 and the contract is substantially complete. Pipelaying is complete and the new pumping station at Pairc na hAbhann has been commissioned and is operating. Some road resurfacing works in the town and reinstatement works in private lands and estates are ongoing.

The project consisted of:

- Approx. 3.9km of gravity sewer, which includes 3 no. railway crossings and 4 no. river crossings.
- Decommissioning of the existing Caheroyn PS.
- New pumping station at Pairc na hAbhann.
- Approx. 460m of rising main.
- Project will facilitate decommissioning of 9 no. DPIs.

#### BALLYGAR WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

A planning application was submitted in April 2024 and a Further Information Request has issued. Land and wayleave acquisition is advanced and going through legal at present. Site investigation was carried out in 2017 and some additional investigation was completed by Irish Drilling at the end of 2023. The project is expected to be bundled with Mountbellew WWTP. Construction is expected to commence towards the end of 2025.

#### MOUNTBELLEW WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

A new planning application is expected to be submitted in the coming months. Land and wayleave acquisition is complete and site investigation is complete. The project is expected to be bundled with Ballygar and construction should start towards the end of 2025.

# ROUNDSTONE WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

The judicial review of the CPO for the preferred site is ongoing, and a hearing is expected to take place in early December 2024. In the meantime, Irish Drilling have completed site investigation on the foreshore for the terminal pumping station, (which will be required in any case).

# AN CHEATHRÚ RUA WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

Similar to Roundstone, the preferred site for An Cheathrú Rua WWTP has been tied up with judicial reviews. Following a decision by An Bord Pleanála to grant planning permission for an alternative project on the preferred site for the proposed An Cheathrú Rua Wastewater Treatment Plant, Uisce Eireann commenced a review of its plans to end the discharge of untreated sewage in An Cheathrú Rua. As a consequence of this review, Uisce Éireann decided to withdraw its Compulsory Purchase Order for that site. A Strategic Assessment of options for the project is currently underway and it is hoped that a shortlist of options to progress the project will be available before the end of the year.

# **EYRECOURT**

Budget approval has been granted to progress the planning and design of a new wastewater treatment plant at Eyrecourt. The options being progressed are for secondary treatment by either installing RBCs or an ICW. Both options will require a new greenfield site.

Ryan Hanley Stantec (RHS) were appointed to progress the project on 15<sup>th</sup> December 2023 and the kick-off meeting was held on 24<sup>th</sup> January 2024. RHS are currently assessing a shortlist of feasible options. It is expected that a preferred option will be selected to proceed to detailed design by November 2024.

#### GREATER GALWAY STRATEGIC DRAINAGE STUDY


The study area covers the Galway MASP catchment, (which includes Baile Chláir), Maigh Cuilinn, and Athenry and the existing unsewered agglomerations of Na Forbacha, Craughwell, Clarinbridge and Kilcolgan. The existing infrastructure consists of 10 networks and 4 WWTPs with an estimated current capacity of 190,000 P.E. The final Strategic Drainage Study Report will consist of the following deliverables:

- Communications Strategy & Plan
- Data Collection Review & Gap Analysis
- Population & Land Use Report
- Hydraulic & Marine Modelling Reports
- Optioneering Reports
- SEA Report

The consultants for the project are Ryan Hanley Stantec and to date they have delivered the Communications Strategy & Plan and Data Collection Reviews & Gap Analysis. The Population & Land Use Report has also been completed.

A long list of options for the strategy is currently being reviewed. A programme of 24 months, (June 2025), has been specified for the completion of the Galway report.







# FIRE & EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

#### **OPERATIONS**

The information below is based on August data from West Regional Control Centre (WRCC). Galway Fire and Rescue Service (GFRS) had 163 turnouts to 139 Incidents. That is a decrease of 2 incidents on 141 the previous month. 42 were fire incidents, 96 were special service incidents (road traffic collision (RTC), Automatic Fire Alarms (AFA's), flooding, storm damage, etc.) and 1 was a standby either in station or at a central location. Of those incidents, 40% were attended by Fire Service resources within 10 minutes of alert, 48.46% were attended between 10 and 20 minutes and 11.56% were attended in over 20 minutes. The average turnout time for the Full-time station in Galway City was 2.03 minutes and for county retained stations was 6.75 minutes.

To date 25 incident reviews have been carried out by senior officers, broken down as follows:



# FIRE APPLIANCE PROCUREMENT PROGRAMME 2023 - 2025

On 19th October Minister Darragh O'Brien announced the new allocation of Class B fire appliances for local authority fire services. GFRS has been allocated 2 new fire appliances under the programme. The Galway appliances are 4th and 5th on the manufacture schedule



of Emergency One, Scotland (the supplier that supplied our most recent new appliance in 2023). Fire service personnel went to Emergency One in June and the final specification agreed and the order has been placed. It is expected that the new appliances will be delivered in Q1 or Q2 2025.

#### CAPITAL PROJECTS

#### ATHENRY FIRE STATION



Construction of the New Fire Station in Athenry is practically complete. It is anticipated that operations will be transferred to the new fire station the week commencing 23 September 2024, subject to the availability of technicians from the regional control centre who are required to transfer the communications and mobilisation systems. All required work for this has already been completed.

#### LOUGHREA FIRE STATION

Following Senior Management Team approval, the revised application under Part 8 of the Planning and Development Regulations for the proposed Loughrea Fire Station has commenced. Briefings for MD members were held on the 08<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> July 2024. Following public consultation, a Report will be brought to Loughrea Municipal District meeting for members consideration.

# BRIGADE MECHANICS WORKSHOP ATHENRY

A Request for Tender for the Design Team has been issued and tenders are due to be received by the 13<sup>th</sup> September 2024. A tender assessment team will consider tenders by the end of September 2024.



#### HEADQUARTERS AND GALWAY CITY FIRE STATION

The preferred site has been identified with Galway City Council. An initial independent planning and flood risk assessment is underway, and it is hoped that this will be completed by the end of September. The capital appraisal is 99% complete and will be submitted to the National Directorate for Fire and Emergency Management once Chief Executive approval is confirmed.

#### **PREVENTION**

The information in the following is based on the August figures. The Fire Authority received 22 Fire Safety Certificate applications and issued decisions on 13 applications. 9 Disability Access Certificate applications were received, and decisions made on 9 applications. A total of 88 new licenses were issued and 21 inspections were conducted.

#### **TRAINING**

The recent 3-week Fire Fighting Skills Course was conducted at Carnmore training centre on the old Galway Airport Site highlighted that the services available at this site proved ideal for the delivery of fire service-related training. Use was also made of the nearby IDA site on the Baile Chláir Road in Oranmore for the conduction of large pump operation drills and emergency traffic management training. The highly successful conduction of this training course at Carnmore Training Centre confirmed the appropriateness and potential of this site as a regional / national training venue for Irish fire services.

Four new firefighter recruits successfully completed their initial training Firefighting Skills course which took place at Carnmore



Training Centre. This brings the total number of new recruits who have completed their initial training thus far in 2024 to 17 which already exceeds the average total annual intake of recruit firefighters. The newly trained recruits will be stationed as follows; 1 at Portumna Fire Station, 1 at Tuam Fire Station and 2 firefighters at Inis Mór Fire Station.

1 no. retained fire service junior officer received recertification training as an instructor in Emergency Services Driving Standard.

1 no. retained firefighter successfully completed a Using Breathing Apparatus Initial Wearers Course which took place in Sligo in August.

It is planned to conduct working at heights training, water rescue training and a Managing Fire Services Incidents Module 1 training course, all in September 2024.

# COLAS (CBE WEST) ORANMORE

A multi-Principal Response Agency review commenced of the Upper Tier COMAH (Control of Major Accident Hazards) Site at Colas in Oranmore, with a Principal Response Agency & relevant stakeholder meeting early in April. The required statutory exercise was conducted on the 23 May 2024 in Oranmore and led by Galway FRS. The updated External Emergency Plan for the site will go for Public Consultation by the end of September. A further blind mobilisation test will be carried out for the site during October and will further test the response of the Local Competent Authorities and GFRS.

# TYNAGH ENERGY / TYNAGH POWER STATION

Tynagh Power Station is a lower tier COMAH (Control of Major Accident Hazards) site. Work is continuing on the finalisation of the external emergency plan and an inter-agency training session on-site is planned for October 2024.




TYNAGH ENERGY LOWER TIER COMAH SITE – TYNAGH, CO GALWAY

# CIRCLE K FUEL TERMINAL - GALWAY PORT

Galway Fire & Rescue Service (GFRS) are also scheduled to receive their new and larger Incident Command Unit (ICU) which is being constructed by Sidhean Teo Ltd in An Spidéal. GFRS are also members of the new High-Capacity Pumping and Urban Search and Rescue project teams which aim to provide hubs in Dublin, Galway, Cork and Westmeath, and Dublin, Galway, Cork, and Laois respectively.

#### **CIVIL DEFENCE**

2 Civil Defence Senior volunteers attended Critical Incident Stress Management training in Dublin, as part of the Civil Defence National Training Programme. The training was provided by the CISM Ireland Network. This course was held over 3 days in the Civil Defence Phoenix Centre, Ratra House, Dublin.

New Volunteers qualified in FAR (First Aid Response) after partaking in training over the past number of weeks. Other Volunteers recertified in CFR A (Cardiac First Response Advanced) within the units.

Civil Defence Units provided support at various events through-out the City and County. Notably the Galway Arts Festival Street Parades and the Galway Football Team Homecoming events in Tuam Stadium and Pearse Stadium. Other various events were supported by the Civil Defence in Ballinasloe, Clonberne, Clifden, Loughrea, Mountbellew and Galway City.

# **KEY PLANNING UPDATES:**

Notifications on submission with respect to the RZLT issued in the month of July. There were 9 submissions in total with 5 exclusion request submissions and 4 seeking rezoning made during the submission period which was from the 1<sup>st</sup> February to the 31<sup>st</sup> May 2024.

The Loughrea Local Area Plan 2024 - 2030 was adopted by the Elected Members on 15<sup>th</sup> July 2024 and came into effect on 26<sup>th</sup> August 2024. Galway County Council received a Draft Direction signed by the Minister of State for Local Government and Planning on the 22nd August 2024. There are elements in relation to the Plan adopted by the Elected Members that are now subject to a Draft Ministerial Direction. The Draft Direction will be on public display from the 29th August to the 12th September 2024. The subject of the Draft Direction will NOT come into effect on 26th August 2024.



The Athenry Local Area Plan 2024 – 2030 was adopted by the Athenry/Oranmore Municipal District Members at their meeting on the 9th January 2024 and came into effect on the 20th February 2024. In accordance with Section 31 of the Planning & Development Act 2000 (as amended), the Athenry Local Area Plan and associated documentation have been modified to reflect the contents of the Ministerial Direction received on the 31st May 2024 in relation to the Athenry Local Area Plan 2024-2030.



#### **ATHENRY**

# TOWN CENTRE FIRST (TCF)

The Town Regeneration Officer and members of the Regeneration team met with the members of the new Athenry Town Team. There were many new faces as well as those more familiar around the table. The Team is full of enthusiasm to get started on the Athenry



TCF plan. The appointed consultants LUC are arranging a meeting with the town team for mid-September to walk the town and discuss potential projects.

#### RRDF PROJECT

Following a detailed application by the Regeneration Team, Athenry was granted €6,075,518.40 Rural Regeneration Development Funding for the Athenry Public Realm Enhancement Scheme Phase1 and the redevelopment of Somers House Burke's Lane to provide a Community and Enterprise Hub. The regeneration team will progress the project with the appointment of consultants and the programming of the construction to commence mid-2025.

#### LOUGHREA

Galway County Council has received and assessed Tenders for the construction phase of the Town Hall proposal. The most competitive and economically advantageous Tenderer was identified, and an additional funding requirement request will be submitted to the Department of Rural and Community Development alongside an updated Business Case, Project report and tender report for approval in September. The Regeneration Team are hopeful the additional required funding will be approved by the Department and look forward to commencing on-site.

The Regeneration team are working with Consultants Helena McElmeel Architects to deliver the redesign of the Long Point swimming area in Loughrea Town. The project is progressing to the submission of a part 10 planning application expected to be lodged September 2024.

#### CLIFDEN

The project consultants LUC are nearing completion of the Planning Package for the application to be submitted to An Bord Pleanála for the Public Realm project for Clifden Town Centre, Harbour Park, and Beach Road Quay.

Works on Destination Towns initiatives funded by Failte Ireland are now completed at the Coach House Pavilion, The Ardbear Bridge (Greenway Readiness) and the Gateway Signage on the approach roads to Clifden. Contractors NUARK, O Malley's, and Kents Steel.

#### **PORTUMNA**

Following a tendering process OBFA architects Ltd have been appointed to develop a Town Trail Strategy. The Strategy document will include at a minimum the indicative design of the trail layout, identification of potential suitable forms of interventions and a public engagement process. The process will result in the creation of 4no. distinct design briefs to be used as a guide to selection of installations or other integrated design interventions within the town environs. This outdoor landscape art & design experience will link the Castle, Workhouse, Courthouse, Forest Park and Blueway Loop Walk through comprehensive wayfinding.



Works are currently progressing ahead of programme at Portumna Courthouse to elements such as, first fix mechanical & electrical, internal rendering, first floor decking, and the foundations to the new café.

The regeneration team architect Brent Mostert gave members of the Portumna Strategic Partnership (OPW, Coillte, Failte Ireland, Waterways Ireland and NPWS) a tour of the Portumna Courthouse construction site.





SITE VISIT TO PORTUMNA COURTHOUSE

The Portumna Public realm enhancement scheme design is ready for the submission of a Part 8 planning application at the end of September, a pre-planning meeting is arranged before the end of the month.

# **GORT**

Gort received €250,000 in town and village funding thanks to an application by the Gort Town Team. 67 applications were received, and the regeneration team will work with the



administrators of the Town & Village scheme to assess the applications over the coming weeks.

As part of the funding under the Historic Structures Fund from the Heritage Council for the Gort Town Hall, a walking Tour of the town was held for Heritage week, organised by the Regeneration Office. This was followed by a performance in the Town Hall by the Wild Swan Theatre Company.



# WALKING TOUR OF GORT FOR HERITAGE WEEK

The Gort Public Realm scheme is in its final stages of preparation for a Part 10 Planning application to An Bord Pleanála. It is expected the application will be submitted by quarter 4 2024.



# TUAM

#### **TOWN HALL**

The Regeneration Team are in the process of finalising the Tender for construction for the Tuam Town hall. It is expected this will be published on etenders in the coming weeks.

# STATION QUARTER THRIVE FUNDING

A tender has been published on etenders with a closing date for submissions of 7<sup>th</sup> October for the development of a masterplan for the Tuan Station Quarter. Members of Northwest Regional Assembly travelled to Tuam and met with members of the Regeneration Team and Local Area office to discuss the proposal for the Tuam Station Quarter and the options for capital funding under the strand 2 THRIVE funding call expected to be announced in the new

#### **BALLINASLOE**

Following on from the successful funding application by the Regeneration team under THRIVE funding to the Northwest Regional Assembly to fund the delivery of a dedicated Town Centre First Plan focusing on the historic core and Fair Green identifying potential projects for future funding applications. A tender is currently live on etenders with a submission closing date of 13the September. The Town Centre First Plan will be delivered in collaboration between the TRO, new Town team and local community.

# URDF CALL 3 - VACANCY AND DERELICTION

Valuers appointed to the three qualifying towns of Ballinasloe, Tuam and Oranmore with 20 properties initially identified as candidate properties that are either vacant or derelict. Ownership is being determined in many cases and engagement will be pursued with these owners to assist in having these properties re-occupied.

# TOWN CENTRE FIRST INITIATIVES- TOWN TEAMS

Galway County Council was granted funding of €30,000 for the establishment of town teams and the preparation of Town Centre health checks for Oranmore, An Cheathrú Rua and Headford. An Expression of Interest call for new members on Town teams in the relevant settlements was issued in August with shortlisting currently being carried out. Following a tendering process Hub Planning have been appointed to work with the new town teams and carry out the health checks in the selected settlements.

# **RURAL SCHEMES**

Town Centre First Suite of Supports for 2024: Project Development

Grants totalling €148,925.00 has been approved by the Department of Community and Rural Development (DRCD) for the refurbishment of Community Centres and development of playground facilities under the Town & Village Renewal Scheme 2024.

This grant is for the implementation of **Project Elements** as set out in the application process. Further to the DRCD's approval, Galway County Council can make a formal offer of funding Sept 2024. The Project element will complete detailed designs and engage professionals to progress redevelopment of the Community Centres in Ahascragh and Clonbur and the development of a playground, skate park and outdoor community recreation space beside the village square in Eyrecourt.



#### GALWAY COUNTY HERITAGE AND BIODIVERSITY PLAN 2024-2030 UPDATE

A new Galway County Heritage and Biodiversity Forum is in place. The Forum has had several meetings with regards to the development of Galway County Heritage and Biodiversity Plan 2024 – 2030. Public consultation has been held and Public Sector Duty requirements has commenced. Environmental Screening has yet to be undertaken and the plan will also have to be translated. It is envisaged that the plan will be ready for finalisation and adoption by Galway County Heritage & Biodiversity Forum, the SPC and Galway County



Council by the end of November 2024.

# NATIONAL HERITAGE WEEK 2024

National Heritage Week 2024 took place from Saturday 17th to Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> August 2024. The Heritage Council once again invited individuals, communities, and organisations to develop Heritage Week projects. There were 111 in person events and 6 digital heritage projects held in the county of Galway. The Heritage Office of Galway County Council worked with many communities, schools, and groups in the county in delivery of their Heritage Week events and projects. The Heritage Office also held many events in partnership with local heritage groups. The events were promoted by Galway County Heritage Office and several events were provided with funding and other supports from the



Heritage Office. Heritage Week merchandise received from the Heritage Council was distributed around the county by Galway County Council Heritage Office. In addition to this this the Heritage Office had bespoke branding materials created and shared with community groups around the county. In addition to this there was a session on 'Ask the Archaeologist' and a session on understanding and how to use various mapping resources. These projects were presented by Bernie Doherty, Galway Community Archaeologist.





#### PRESENTATION ON THE DIGITAL MAPPING OF GRAVEYARDS IN WILLIAMSTOWN

An informative and well attended presentation on the digital mapping of Galway's historic



graveyards was held in Williamstown Parish Hall on Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> August. Attendees has the chance to discover how technology is being used to preserve and document these important cultural sites. They also learned about the process of creating digital maps, the significance of this work for genealogy and local history research and heard about the exciting discoveries made through this project. This event was hosted by the Heritage Office and GIS

Office of Galway County Council in partnership with Williamstown Heritage Society, Williamstown Tidy Towns and Williamstown Graveyard Committees.

Galway County Council working with various community groups and organisations have been collecting and collating valuable data relating to those who are buried in various graveyards for several years. Galway County Council, with funding from the Heritage Council, the Open Data Engagement Fund and its own resources has developed and made available an app specifically for use by surveyors at the local level for memorial surveys, along with associated data management and validation processes. In addition to this Galway County Council, Galway Rural Development, Forum Connemara, and the Heritage Council has provided funding to local groups to employ experts to work with and train local communities on how to use this technology and to undertake drone mapping of graveyards.

Over 97 enthusiastic young participants engaged in a series of interactive sessions focused on the science of sound, the heritage of bees, and the art of botany through the creation of perfume sticks. # OUGHTERARD FORGED GATES PROJECT

The vernacular forged wrought iron field gate is a very valuable, but often neglected, aspect of the cultural heritage of our rural landscape. These field gates were for the most part forged in the local blacksmith's forge.

They are practical and functional while at the same time an artistic expression of the blacksmith who



made them. During the twentieth century cast-iron, tubular steel and other mass-produced gates became more common while at the same time the forged wrought iron gates went into decline as did the blacksmiths forge. In addition to this changing farming practices has led to many of these gates being abandoned in hedges and fields as the older forged wrought iron field gates became too small to accommodate the newer and bigger machines entering fields. However, to the careful observer there are still many beautifully crafted wrought iron field gates to be found.



Therefore, the aim of this project is to identify, record, raise awareness of the wealth of wrought iron field gates that are to be found in the Oughterard area. It will also seek to identify the names of the local blacksmiths and their forges. The exhibition was launched on Monday 19<sup>th</sup> August by Marie Mannion, Heritage Officer. A large and very engaged group of people attended this launch.

<u>Succession Planning: A Guide for Community Archives and Heritage Groups</u> is a free resource developed by the Irish Community Archive Network (iCAN) - a National Museum of Ireland initiative delivered in partnership with the Heritage Council, participating Local Authorities (including Galway County Council Heritage Office) and community groups across Ireland.

The Guide looks at ways volunteer groups can address some of the challenges that can influence their future success. Common challenges include attracting new members, getting young people involved; keeping adequate records; or losing access to accounts due to lost passwords or IT crashes.

Effective succession planning addresses these challenges so that groups can safeguard their work into the future.

iCAN was set-up to support volunteer groups across Ireland to develop and maintain their own community archive. It developed the Guide to provide a simple step-by-step process for good succession planning - from having written goals, objectives, and operational procedures to protecting passwords and access to websites and social media accounts.

Roundstone's Hidden Heritage Conference Draws Capacity Crowd



Celebrating 200 Years of Roundstone's Founding and Hely Dutton's Statistical Survey of Galway





The Roundstone Community Centre buzzed with excitement as it hosted the Roundstone's Hidden Heritage 1824 - 2024 Conference, an event that saw people from all parts of the county and the local community gather in remarkable numbers to celebrate a significant bicentennial milestone. Aisling Keane in her lecture paid tribute to the invaluable contributions of Tim and Mairead Robinson, whose meticulous archival work has preserved Connemara's cultural and natural heritage.



While Clifden native, Kathleen Villiers-Tuthill explored Alexander Nimmo's profound influence on the infrastructure of the West and his pivotal role in the establishment of Roundstone, framing him as a key figure in the region's development.

# NATIONAL HERITAGE WEEK 2024

There were more than 25 Biodiversity and Natural Heritage themed events held across the

county of Galway for National Heritage Week which ran from  $17^{th} - 25^{th}$  August. The Galway County Biodiversity Office was involved with numerous events including Sustainable Gardening Workshop with horticulturist Aoife Munn in Ballinderreen Community Centre, which was attended by 40 gardeners, including volunteers from local community groups such as the



Tidy Towns and environmental groups from Ballinderreen, Kinvara, Clarinbridge, and Ardrahan.





A webinar on the Mayflies of Ireland was held during National Heritage Week, highlighting the work of one of the Galway County Council's Local Biodiversity Action Fund projects in partnership with other local authorities. The webinar was presented by Dr Baars who is currently leading a team of researchers to complete a two-year red listing exercise to determine the current conservation status of all mayfly species in Ireland.

The Biodiversity Officer was a guest speaker at Cuisle an Chomhshaoil on the 21<sup>st</sup> August in as part of the Siúlóid Dúlra by the bogs near Seanscoil Sailearna, Indreabhán.



# NO MOW AREA RINVILLE PARK

In August, a 'near threatened' orchid was found in Renville Park for the first time in over 80 years. The park is managed by Galway County Council and in a joint environmental initiative by the Council and Conservation Volunteers Galway to attract pollinating insects to Rinville Park, a designated area was selected as a pilot plot for a No Mow area. This initiative's success led to the discovery of 20 to 30 Autumn Lady's Tresses Orchids, listed as 'Near Threatened' in the Red Data List of Vascular Plants 2016. Other orchid species, such as Bee Orchids, Common Spotted Orchids, and Fragrant Orchids, also bloomed earlier in the summer in this area, indicating high species diversity. On August 29th, a public talk was held at the No Mow plot, featuring the Council Biodiversity Officer, Galway Conservation Volunteers, and local botanist Mark O'Mahoney, who first discovered the orchid. Cathaoirleach Albert Dolan joined the team to learn about the species and see the flowering orchid.










# LOCAL BIODIVERSITY ACTION FUND UPDATE



A new video showcasing the efforts to learn more about Merlin in Connemara was launched as part of a Galway County Council digital project during National Heritage Week. This video was produced as part of one of Galway County Council's Local Biodiversity Action Fund projects, which is supported by the National Parks & Wildlife Service. Merlin are one of our rarest and most elusive birds of prey in Ireland, and the blanket bogs of

Connemara in the west of Ireland is one of the most important places for the species and is designated as a Special Protection Area for Merlin. Despite the designation, there is still a lot to learn about Merlin in this landscape and nationally to be able to help conserve their populations. This video documents some of the efforts on behalf of BirdWatch Ireland, the National Parks and Wildlife Service and Galway County Council to improve our understanding of Merlin populations and their conservation requirements as well as showcasing this special bird in this unique landscape.

The Botanical Survey of Lough Corrib Islands is now nearing completion with over 20 islands studied with populations of *Vicia orobus* and Calamagrostis recorded, both of which are species protected under the Floral Protection Order.

# NATIONAL HEDGEROW WEEK

National Hedgerow Week is a partnership between Teagasc and the Heritage Council. The week aims to raise awareness of the importance of hedges for agriculture, biodiversity, and



climate. Rosina Joyce, Biodiversity Officer spoke to members of the farming community about the importance of hedgerows in County Galway, the role they play in supporting wildlife and the benefits of hedgerows from a farmer's perspective.

### MEDIA OUTREACH

Interviews with the Biodiversity Officer were broadcast on both RTE Radio 1's Mooney Goes



Wild and Galway Talks on Galway Bay FM. Coverage of Galway County Council's no mow area in Renville Park was also covered in Agriland, Irish Independent, RSVP.ie and AFLOAT.ie as well as local media outlets including The Tuam Herald, Connacht Tribune, Clare Echo, Galway Daily, Galway Beo and Galway Bay FM news.



# BALLINASLOE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT UPDATE

Ballinasloe MD staff and contractors on its behalf continued the delivery of the 2024 roadworks programme throughout the MD during July and August, with primary focus on Restoration Maintenance (RM) Surface Dressing during this period. The overall roadworks programme is also made up of Restoration Improvement (RI) Bituminous Overlay and Inlay projects, Restoration Improvement (RI) Unbound and Recycling projects. In all cases, Ballinasloe MD direct labour roads crews undertake extensive preparatory works to each road section, followed by road resurfacing contractors works. To date, 43 of 48 RI (~90%) projects



are complete, while 23 of 23 RM projects (100%) are complete. This programme is ongoing and is being delivered successfully, however its progress is heavily dependent on contractor availability and weather conditions.

Preparations are now also underway for the October Fair 2024 in Ballinasloe, where we are targeting further improvements to the success in 2023, in terms of traffic and waste management, trading and general business uplift throughout Ballinasloe. Separately throughout the MD, Community Wardens are continuously dealing with illegal dumping, parking enforcement, and various inspections including ring buoys and playgrounds. Grass cutting is being undertaken primarily within Ballinasloe Town, with an increased focus on areas for biodiversity. Works have also been completed in conjunction other Sections of Galway County Council and other state agencies. The following images present a flavour of

# UPDATE ON ACTIVITIES FOR CONAMARA - SEPTEMBER 2024

• The Restoration Improvement Works, Restoration Maintenance Works, and Discretionary Grant works now substantially complete.



- An application for funding regarding for Inishbofin, Inis Mor, Inis Meáin and Inis Oírr was submitted to the Department of Rural Community Development. Funding was granted for works on Inis Mor and Inishbofin. Works are due to commence in late September/early October.
- An allocation of €30,000 has been granted by the Department of Transport to progress a Strategic Infrastructure Scheme at Cuan na Loinge to address flooding of the main road into this area.
- Safety Improvement Works allocation of €35,000 to refurbish the traffic signal heads and push button units in Maigh Cuilinn is now complete.
- 3 No. Climate Change Projects in the Conamara MD now complete.
- Community Wardens 3 positions (1No. position recently filled) dealing with illegal dumping, parking enforcement, ringbuoy inspections.
- Town and Village Maintenance substantially done by direct staff.
- Piers & Harbours- Direct labour projects ongoing under marine infrastructure scheme.
- Operation & Maintenance of Public Beaches- Implementation of Summer Ready 2024 now complete. Review to commence to assess this year's programme.

- 3No. Low-Cost Safety Improvement (LCSI) Schemes. 2No. currently underway.



# TUAM MUNICIPAL DISTRICT UPDATE

Road improvement and road surfacing schemes continued over the summer months with all schemes to be concluded in September. To date 49 of the 59 road improvement schemes have been completed with 21 surface dressing schemes completed. Funding for 6 Local Improvement Schemes were granted in June with 5 completed and 1 scheme commenced.

The Department of Rural and Community Development recently announced funding for the Community Recognition fund to support communities that have welcomed people from Ukraine and other countries. Tuam Municipal District received over €74,000 for the Sensory Garden and a Dog Park in Palace Grounds in Tuam.

### **GALWAY GAA HOMECOMING**



Tuam Municipal District office and the roads staff along with the Community Wardens across the county were heavily involved in organising and running the Civic reception for the homecoming of the Senior All Ireland Finalists Galway. Unfortunately, the result did not go the way of Galway but there still was a good turn out to greet the team.

#### PUBLIC CONSULTATION BALLYGADDY PARK

A public consultation process for the enhancement of Ballygaddy Park in Tuam Town was advertised on Consultgalway.ie in August to invite the public to have a say to help make the

best possible Ballygaddy Park plan for Tuam town.

A public space already exists on the Ballygaddy Road in Tuam; however, it is currently predominantly a grassed area. It is located next to 300 houses and within 800m of the town



centre. A design for the enhancement of the park has been completed by a landscape architect.

The proposed park enhancement will involve-

- Proposed pathways constructed from exposed aggregate concrete
- Creating loop walks around the park, and intermittent informal play features, and seating/rest locations.
- Seating areas for community engagement,
- Biodiversity planting with native species and wildflower spaces.

# NATIONAL ROAD NETWORK GALWAY

# WORKS FUNDED ON THE NATIONAL ROAD NETWORK IN GALWAY

A significant amount of survey work on the National Network in Galway has occurred since the beginning of the year with the anticipation of receiving funding on par with recent years. Currently there is about €1m worth of defects on the National roads that needs repair. There has been substantial deterioration of the road network over the past six months compared to other years due to weather and storm damage. Through the TII Defects



Management system which logs defects and allows to apply for additional funding Galway County Council received €180,000 in July.

This funding will allow significant faults and defects on the Network to be repaired in the coming months by the Municipal District office responsible for the location of the defect.

### HD28 WORKS FUNDED

The TII have funded four schemes in 2024 under the HD28 programme. The HD28 locations below are sites on the National Road network which have been identified by TII surveys for having poor skid resistance. It is the recommendation of TII that these sites be resurfaced. The purpose of the HD28 schemes is to treat the existing surface by removing the existing surface at these locations and resurface to increase skid resistance. The works will include retexturing, milling/planing out of existing surfaces, disposal of waste to correct licensed facility and relaying new surface.
