CONTEMPO STRING QUARTET GALWAY ENSEMBLE IN RESIDENCE



Cinemobile, Ireland's travelling cinema, is a large truck, which transforms in less than an hour into a 100-seater state of the art cinema.

Cinemobile has spent the past three years touring to towns and communities without access to cinema throughout the entire island. Spending two days in each location, Cinemobile screens three films each day with programmes varying in range from short films and animation to feature films. During the course of each day Cinemobile screens primarily to children and young people.

Since its inception it has toured to Galway City, Clifden, Oughterard, Gort, Spiddal, Glenamaddy, Loughrea, Ballinasloe and Tuam. Cinemobile is always seeking new locations and schools, the size of the town or village does not matter, an eager audience the requirement!



What can Cinemobile offer?

Prior to its visit Cinemobile notifies schools of its intended tour dates and programme by post. It has compiled a list of secondary school curriculum-based titles, which it circulates to all schools in advance of its visit. Schools are then invited to choose which title they would like to see and at what time.

Essentially Cinemobile asks the schools to programme the venue as they wish. In some instances where a school does not have a full house for a screening, Cinemobile invites other schools to attend the screening.

All schools are welcome to request titles of their choice. The Cinemobile team strive to meet all requests made. Its secondary schools titles changes from year to year. Two weeks before its visit to a location it follows up on its earlier schools mailing with a phone call or a visit from the Audience Development Officer to remind schools of its imminent arrival and invite them to book a time slot and title.

What must a participating school provide?

In some instances Cinemobile parks in a central location within a town, schools will then have to walk/bus to this central location. In the case of large schools wishing to attend several screenings in one day Cinemobile will park on the school grounds if suitable parking is available. A large flat space of 20m x 20m is required as a parking space along with good access (wide gate etc). Schools are asked to remember that there are no toilet facilities in the Cinemobile. Cost per pupil is €4 and teachers are free. Cinemobile is wheelchair accessible.

Cinemobile invites requests from all schools. It will incorporate their request into our tour.

Schools are welcome to contact Cinemobile year round.

What can ConTempo offer?

At present, the Quartet is involved in a collaborative schools project with the Galway Education Centre. The project offers the experience of classical music to pupils with all levels of musical experience in four schools throughout the county (2 primary and 2 post-primary). The quartet will visit each school on six separate occasions during this time. Outside of this project there would be limited time and resources to visit schools on a once-off basis at least until the projects' completion in June.

In addition to the schools project from January to June, the ConTempo Quartet offer hour-long workshops to primary and second level schools on an individual basis at any time during the academic year. Classes with pupils of all ages can take part. Normally groups are limited to 30 pupils only but if a performance as opposed to a workshop is required, then larger groups of pupils can be catered for.

What must a participating school provide?

Schools would be expected to dedicate a teacher to be present throughout the quartet's visit to the school to assist with discipline, advise on varying abilities and needs of pupils etc. Furthermore, the teacher would be required to spend a small amount of time preparing the class that will take part in the visit with resource materials sent from the Ensemble in Residence office beforehand.

Generally, no school within the county boundary of Galway is ruled out from receiving a visit from the ConTempo. For the Schools Project currently underway schools were selected on a lottery basis after fulfilling some basic criteria (class size, age range, availability of teacher etc.)

Architect in Residence

In developing the Galway Arts **Centre's** philosophy and approaches to working with children and teachers, in both English and Irish language schools, throughout primary and secondary education, it aims to develop programmes for teachers interested in using contemporary art and literature as source in classroom based projects within the new national curriculum.

What can Galway Arts Centre offer?

Visual Art: Through its "resource room" teachers are encouraged to use the information and resources available and advice on planning teaching sessions in the gallery is given, enabling a better link with a school group's visit to the art centre, to the work they are doing in the classroom.

Literature: Galway Arts Centre's Literature Programme includes the Cúirt International Festival of Literature which offers the Cúirt Writers-in-Schools Scheme to transition year students in Galway City and County.

Examples of projects undertaken by the Galway Arts Centre:

Placing Art in Schools

The outreach exhibition programme invites each exhibiting Artist at the Galway Arts Centre to loan a piece of work that relates to the exhibition, to be exhibited in a school, for the duration of the exhibition.

City-Link: A mapping project

The Galway Arts Centre works with schools who are eager to engage more with the visual arts using new media in the classroom. The project aims to provide Transition Year pupils with the chance to develop the skills to acquire and exchange information on their environment with other similar projects in schools in Europe. It involves pupils ranging in ages from 15 to 17 years of age. Their resulting creations are exhibited where possible in a public space in the community.

Cúirt Writers-in-Schools Scheme

Students are given the opportunity to take part in a creative writing workshop, ending with a public reading of their work during the Cúirt Festival (19-24 April 2005). The workshops will take place once a week for six weeks in Galway Arts Centre February-March 2005; the deadline for applications is Monday January 10 2005.


What must a participating school provide?

What can the Architect in **Residence offer?**

The Architect in Residence will work with secondary school students, exploring the role, function and potential of Architecture in their area.

This is the first project of its nature in Galway and aims to increase appreciation of and engagement with the architectural heritage and urban landscape of Galway City and County.

The Architect in Residence will visit the school and work with the students on developing a specific project relative to the local area. The project will result in an exhibition at the end of the academic year. The project will be documented throughout the year.

What must a participating school provide?

Good commitment. This is a year-long project. The selected schools will be asked to supply some materials in relation to the project. As this is a pilot project, exact project outline will be determined when the schools are selected.

What can Galway Film Centre offer?

Flying Film Squads

Make your own film. A series of practical workshops whereby participants are taken through the fundamental principles and practicalities of making a short film under the guidance of professional film-makers. (Cost: can be tailormade)

Schools Workshops/Masterclasses

One-off workshops/masterclasses with professional filmmakers on specific aspects of filmmaking eg. camera, scriptwriting, editing. (Cost: depending on activity)

Educational/Curriculum Talks

Film is now part of the English syllabus. Bring film screenings to life with film analysis and discussion from a professional film-maker.

Animation Workshops

Create your own animated short film with the help of a professional animator with ease and simplicity on the unique 'animation lunchbox' - a self-contained animation production unit. A fun, quick for students to explore creative story-telling and visual images. (Cost: nominal charge)

What must a participating school provide?

The Centre will provide all equipment required for the activities. Schools will be required to liaise directly with the Centre in order to build a programme which will specifically meet their needs and requirements.

On Flying Film Squads, the input and full commitment of students and involvement of teachers and parents is essential. The Film Squads are time and labour intensive - at least 6 days. Whilst hard work, the Film Squads are its most popular and rewarding activity.

All schools have access to Galway Film Centre's education activities.

Schools may apply at any time throughout the year. However a two-month lead-in time to the Flying Film Squads is necessary in order to devise and plan your specific programme.

Galway Youth Theatre's Outreach

projects operate on three distinct levels:

Artistically

- Provides young people with the experiences of devising, scripting and performing theatrical works
- The drama workshop programme provides the necessary expertise with which these objectives can be successfully achieved

Socially

- Creates an environment in which members can express and communicate ideas
- Encourages interaction from members across the wide social, economic and geographical spectrum.

Educationally

- Offers young people a drama workshop programme that allows them to acquire a variety of drama skills facilitated by theatre professionals through weekly workshop sessions, leading to showcasing their work publicly.
- Operates in an environment where access to drama is limited or non-existent.

Shakespeare in Schools For many young people Shakespeare is their first (and often only) encounter with theatre. Shakespeare, like all theatre, should be performed, yet young people are seldom given an opportunity to examine his work through this medium. It is with this in mind that Galway Youth Theatre has devised a new educational project -Shakespeare in Schools. It is a practical workshop-based project facilitated by acclaimed actor and director Rod Goodall.

The project is being aimed at post-primary schools. It is primarily for Transition Year students, as they will have more affordable time. The project could be taken by any of the post-primary school classes. Only twenty participants can avail of the 1-hour workshop.

Introductory Workshops in Drama


GYT also facilitate workshops that introduce participants to the basic skills of drama. These workshops are aimed at schools with no strong tradition in theatre. The programme helps students and teachers to explore group creativity and provide a safe environment to practice the skills of drama.

What must a participating school provide?

Galway Youth Theatre always expects the school to participate in the workshops or projects. The workshops are aimed to help teachers to learn as well as students. Their participation can ensure that the work started can continue to develop in the school.

No materials are required but it does expect a large and safe space to facilitate the workshops and that teachers are present at all times during the workshops. There are numerous costs to establish and run these projects. It would like the school (where possible) to help meet the costs of the programmes. This can be discussed between GYT and the interested schools.

A long-term aim of the project is to prompt debate on how Shakespeare and theatre are being studied within the educational syllabus



Junior Galway Film Fleadh

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The Junior Film Fleadh is an annual film festival for young people up to the age of eighteen. The JGFF was founded in 1995 aiming to address young people as a distinctive cinema-going audience and to encourage young people to become involved in film as an art form through screenings, filmmaking projects and related activities.

To date the festival has run for four days each November. This year, by way of celebrating the tenth Junior Film Fleadh, we aim to extend the festival to five days.

Festival dates will be confirmed in June 2004.

With twelve or more feature film screenings over the course of the festival, a large section of the programme is dedicated to screening films of particular interest to secondary school groups (e.g. screenings of Shakespeare adaptations, German and French language films, screen adaptations of syllabus-related novels and films specifically on the English and Media Studies syllabi). Introductions, talks and study guides accompany a number of these screenings.

We screen contemporary world cinema and classic films specifically made about and for young people. We screen the completed films from the Young Film Makers Projects and a number of other short films made by young people from all over Ireland in one gala afternoon screening. We provide teacher training workshops relating to some specific festival screenings and more general workshops on teaching film in the classroom.

What can Junior Galway Film Fleadh offer?

Young Film Makers Project

The Young Film Makers Project was set-up in 1999 and since then seventeen short films have been produced with school groups in Galway City and County.

Under the guidance of a JFF filmmaking tutor, Transition Year groups and, in exceptional cases, other school groups have the opportunity to make a short film using up-to-date digital video equipment. The film is then screened at the next Junior Film Fleadh*.

Two projects are held in the last school term of each year and two in the first term of the next year. We are now looking for schools interested in September 2004 and the Summer term 2005.

The overall cost to the JGFF of each project is in excess of €3000. Participating schools will be asked for a €200 contribution to the project.

What must a participating school provide?

Interested schools should e-mail or write to us with their contact details. A visit by the JFF tutor to meet the teacher will be arranged and the group size, dedication/ interest of the teacher involved, the term timetable and the interest of the group is noted. The tutor and Festival Coordinator then decide on what schools will be chosen. Generally, schools who have not participated in the scheme previously are given priority.



Macnas

Macnas' main body of work consists of making and staging large scale spectacles. Central to these is the involvement of community participants. Members of the community are invited into the Macnas workshop to make, rehearse and perform these events

Macnas' work in second-level schools consists of the hosting of work placements for Transition Year, Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme and Youthreach students. During their time in Macnas students participate in the on-going work of Macnas.



Students on placement have in the past participated in mask making and performance, puppet making and manipulation, prop making, fabric printing and painting, woodwork, performance; participated in school visits and participated in Macnas events and on occasion students have contributed to the on-going maintenance of the workshop.

There are usually a number of students from several different schools and other educational institutions in Macnas at the same time. This has sometimes included students from overseas. Macnas encourages students to mix and support each other during their placements so as to get the best out of it.

All students are supervised by Macnas arts workers while on placement. Students are therefore able to draw on the experience of this group throughout the duration of their placement. As Macnas operates an open door policy as regards the workshop it is often the case that students on placement can benefit from the experience of other artists and practitioners who drop by.

What must a participating school provide?

Placements are largely self selecting. The school or student makes the approach to Macnas regarding work placements. Macnas requires written notice from the schools for students seeking work experience. This should arrive at least three weeks before the intended dates for the placement. Macnas also requires details of insurance cover for the student while on placement.

On completion of a placement Macnas asks the student to fill in a brief questionnaire regarding their experience. This information is very useful for Macnas in terms of feedback and for the development of its on-going placement programme.

There is no closing date for work placements as Macnas host placements throughout the year.

The National **Chamber Choir**



The National Chamber Choir is one of Ireland's premier chamber music ensembles. In May 2002 the Choir welcomed Cologne based conductor, Celso Antunes to the group as its new Artistic Director and Chief Conductor. The 17 singers that make up this highly motivated professional choir are some of the finest young voices in the country. The group has received high praise both at home and abroad for the beauty and warmth of its sound and the vivacity of its performance. The Choir gives upwards of 60 live concerts a year, including a Summer and Winter series at the National Gallery in Dublin and two Irish tours each year. Internationally, the choir has toured in Brazil, Spain and Sweden and forthcoming engagements include concerts in the Czech Republic and Poland.

The project is open to all schools offering Music as a Leaving Cert. subject. It is particularly useful for students with an interest in singing and for students taking Composing as a Higher Elective for the Leaving Certificate. The teacher should be willing to lead the project in the school. Schools apply in writing via a standard application form. This is available on the NCC website, and is sent out to all Post Primary schools in September each year.

Applications should be made to the National Chamber Choir by early September 2004.



Music for Galway was founded in 1981 to provide audiences in Galway City and County with the opportunity to enjoy a wealth of music throughout the year. An annual season of concerts runs from September to May, bringing music and musicians from around the world to Galway.



What can Music for Galway offer?

Music for Galway can send composers or performers to schools where they do workshops on composing or performing and talk about their lives and work. This often leads to a better understanding of classical music, breaks down boundaries and overcomes certain reluctances that many teenagers have.

Meeting composers and performers within the music programme is also very beneficial, as the chance of dealing with such highly skilled professionals proves to be very inspiring to the music students.

What must a participating school provide?

This can vary from school to school and from visitor to visitor. In some cases the artist can tailor the nature of the visit to the abilities or preferences of the school.

At times a class room suffices. Sometimes a piano or a CD player may be required. It really depends on who will be coming.

So far Music for Galway has selected schools in Galway and surroundings that it knew. However, it would be very pleased to make new contacts.

Music for Galway's programme for 2004/05 will be out by the end of September. Schools that are interested should contact Music for Galway as soon as possible after that.

What can The National Chamber

"Composition Workshops" is a two year project comprising a variety of events including:

• An introduction to composing for choir with the National Chamber Choir and a series of visits to each school by professional composers and singers from the National

• In the second year there are recording sessions where composers act as producers for a recording of their piece, and a gala concert featuring a selection of all the pieces composed over the

• Composers who complete the project receive a Certificate of Achievement and a recording of each piece is presented. There are special awards made for the most promising individual composer and the most original group composition.

What must a participating school provide?

The students would need to travel to Dublin once at the beginning of the project for the introductory session, and once in the second year for the Gala Concert. If the NCC is touring in the school's area, the recording sessions take place locally, if not, they take place in Dublin. The in-school sessions should take place where possible in a room with access to a keyboard. Access to music notation computer software, though not essential, is an advantage. Teachers should be present at all the sessions and help, monitor and encourage the students' progress in between the sessions.

What can Writers in Schools, Poetry Ireland offer?

The Writers in Schools Scheme part-funds visits by writers/storytellers to primary and secondary schools throughout the Republic of Ireland. Visit formats range from a talk, or reading, to a workshop, or storytelling session, and schools can choose from over 200 artists. Writers in Schools Residencies was set up to enhance work already being carried out through the Writers in Schools Scheme and to develop approaches, which enable the participants to explore the world of the imagination over a longer period of time, in the company of an experienced writer. Residencies consist of a short residency by a writer/storyteller working closely with one teacher and one class group.

What must a participating school provide?

Schools must contact and organise arrangements with the writer/storyteller prior to application. Teachers should discuss the visit(s) with the writer/storyteller before it takes place. Schools are expected to complete a short evaluation form after the visit(s) has happened.

Every primary and secondary school in the Republic is entitled to apply for Writers in Schools Scheme visit. For budgetary reasons however, Writers in Schools may not be able to accede to all requests, therefore it is advisable to apply as early as possible. Writers in Schools Residencies are selected on a case by case analysis based on the rationale of the application, and needs and wants of the individual school.

Taibhdhearc na Gaillimhe

Taibhdhearc na Gaillimhe, is Ireland's national Irish language theatre company. Its main aim is the development and promotion of Irish language theatre throughout the country. It is a professional theatre company and produces five full length plays each year and runs a biennial season of short works - Scáilí Samhna & Fuadar Feabhra - to encourage up and coming talent.

Central to Taibhdhearc na Gaillimhe's vision is the provision of quality theatre for young people and providing opportunities for young people to develop their interest in theatre and to introduce them to the theatre as an artform and social activity. Please note that all of our programmes and classes are through Irish.

Established in 2003 Na Crosáin is a workshop based course in all aspects of theatre aimed at giving young people the chance to develop their interest in theatre through the medium of the Irish language.

Each course runs over a 15 week period and caters for two age groups on an alternate basis. The first semester runs from September to December and is called Ardán, this course is for people in the 16 - 18 year old age bracket - the second is called Dordán, catering for the 13 - 15 year old age bracket and this course runs from January to May. There are 20 places available both in Galway, in An Taibhdhearc Theatre each Saturday morning from 10am to 12 pm and in Ros a Mhíl on Friday evenings from 6pm to 8pm.

Directed by Marc Mac Lochlainn, founder of the educational theatre company Branar Drámaíocht, the course gives students a basic understanding of all elements of theatre. Guest teachers also give classes in their various areas of expertise and students get the opportunity to put these skills to practical use at the end of the course by staging their own show on the Taibhdhearc stage.

An Taibhdhearc is delighted with the success of Na Crosáin which is still in its infancy and looks forward to further developments in the years to come. Enthusiasm and a good level of conversational Irish are the only requirements for entry which is on an interview basis.

What must a participating school provide?

On-site workshops have an associated per student cost which is established on consultation with the school.

Na Crosáin is held outside of school hours and there is a per student cost of €75 for the 15 week course.

Schools are chosen on an enquiry and consultative basis for on-site workshops.

Western Writers' Centre

Teatro Punto is a multicultural theatre company based in Galway City. The full-time members come from Ireland, Spain and Mallorca and the company collaborates throughout the year with actors from other European countries such as England, France, Italy and Holland. The style of Teatro Punto comes from the popular traditions of theatre with the idea of making theatre "for and with the audience".

The company devises its own shows and uses traditional music from all over Europe and as well different languages in each show. The stories are told using a combination of movement, action and dialogue. Improvisation and direct contact with the audience are also essential factors in the performances providing immediate feedback from the audience and also bringing the audience into the story. Together all these ingredients produces a theatre style that is original and unique to Teatro Punto and is enjoyed in many countries across Europe.



What can Teatro Punto offer?

Teatro Punto offer workshops in Theatre, Mask, Mask making, Clowning, Mime, Improvisation, Movement and Music in Theatre.

Teatro Punto has a many years experience in giving workshops and recently it has become one of the main activities of the company. The company design and run workshops for groups such as professional actors to young children and can also cater for people with special needs. 
What must a participating school provide?

To hold the workshops Teatro Punto require a room or school hall to work in; all other materials will be supplied by Teatro Punto.

Teatro Punto's Workshops are open to all schools.

Expressions of interest from schools interested in participating can be sent to Teatro Punto an on-going basis. The Western Writers' Centre is the only writers' centre West of the Shannon. Its aims and objectives include bringing the notion and novelty of Creative Writing, prose and poetry, to everyone. It intends to target areas of socioeconomic deprivation; it also engages in bringing writers' classes to centres of employment, schools, and to areas where no writers' groups currently exist. It provides a focus point for everyone in the West of Ireland interested in Creative Writing.

It will establish writers' groups in a variety of areas when requested to do so. It liaises with writers' organisations such as Poetry Ireland and the Irish Writers' Centre in Dublin. And it provides information on various points of creative access; to applying for grants, publishing, to finding an agent. It was the first arts organisation in the Galway City or County area to establish a writers' residency in a major hospital - Merlin Park. The Centre also organised a 'Poetry on the Buses' scheme in association with Bus Éireann, a first for



the Galway and West region and, indeed for the country. The Centre also runs an annual Winter literary weekend. Artform Literature

What can the Western Writers' Centre offer?

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The Centre would be particularly interested in working on Creative Writing projects with Transition Year students. These projects could take the form or (a) working with Active Retirement groups to bring about creative work, such as an anthology, and/or (b) working to promote anthologies or poetry and prose around the history or geography of place. The Centre would also bring in writers of note to read or advise when suitable. The Centre's founder and Manager, Fred Johnston, has worked with a similar project to (a) in Louisburg, Co Mayo. He is also the founder of the Cúirt Festival of Literature, as a poetry festival, in 1986.

What must a participating school provide?

It is advisable that the school should have, at some curriculum level, an interest in Creative Writing and/or may have encouraged pupils in developing an interest in writing poetry or prose. It would be preferable - but not mandatory - if the interested school were to have some knowledge of the Writers in Schools Scheme or Writers in Community Scheme, and have engaged students at some level in contemporary Irish writing, either by study or by previous writers' visits. Schools should try to acquaint themselves with the idea of how an invited writer might work; the Centre can provide details of this.

The school would be expected to canvass students to gauge interest and select a group of no more than ten students to participate in a given project. The school might also suggest a Creative Writing project. The school should think also in terms of an anthology or publication to headline the given project at its conclusion.
