COUNTY GALWAY TOURISM STRATEGY 2023-2031

This is the first ever tourism strategy to be adopted for **County Galway**. The purpose of the Tourism Strategy is to provide a focused approach to tourism development and promotion to increase the contribution of tourism to the County's economy while protecting and enhancing sustainability and the quality of life in County Galway.

Project management is currently underway for an implementation plan on the strategy, this will seek to stimulate tourism development throughout Galway, enhancing it in areas that are already strong and nurturing it in areas that are less mature from a tourism perspective with a commitment to delivering economic, social, cultural, and environmental benefits to diverse locations and communities. The plan will also inform the tourism team of the actions and tasks required to achieve the strategic goals in the strategy.

MARKETING CAMPAIGN

Due to the excellent feedback and successful editions, The Tourism Team will continue to invest in a County based marketing spread with '**This is Galway**'. We have highlighted areas like Kinvara, Gort and Moycullen and will continue to showcase what County Galway has to offer and will be focusing on east Galway for the next editions.

'Where West'

A full colour, high quality magazine circulated throughout the west- from Connemara to the Islands; south to north Galway; north Mayo to south Clare.

'Go West'

Galway County Council annually invest in the 'Go West' magazine of Knock Airportalongside local authority partners in Sligo; Mayo, Roscommon and Galway City. For 2023 - coverage includes highlighting festivals and events supported by GCC and promoting the best aspects of the visitor experience around the County including North/East Galway and highquality photography to promote Tourism in the County.

'The Spirit of Ireland Magazine'

Four pages were published with 'The Spirit of Ireland magazine' for Promoting the 10th Anniversary of the Wild Atlantic Way 2024.

The magazine will be promoted at all Tourist Attractions in Galway. The Spirit of Ireland Magazine targets the North American Tourists.

The magazine is the official publication of the North American Celtic Trade Association. NACTA brings visitors to Ireland to the value of 3.6 million annually.



Galway County and City Tourism Officers are collaborating on a new Tourism Specific website for Galway that will also highlight the new Galway Tourism Brand.

BEACHES

Galway's beaches all have excellent water quality and stunning scenery and are managed by the local authority in partnership with one or more local Clean Coast groups.

Blue Flag Beaches

Six beaches in County Galway have been awarded the prestigious Blue Flag Award with a further six beaches receiving the coveted Green Coast Award for 2024. At a National Awards ceremony held at the Galway Bay Hotel in Salthill on Monday 20th May.

The Blue Flags were awarded to :

Taught beach has regained its Blue Flag having lost its status in 2022. It is a major boost to the local community and tourism sector in Kinvara.

Blue flags are awarded to bathing areas that meet excellent water quality standards and provide various amenities, including lifeguards and toilet facilities.

LIFEGUARD SERVICE

Galway County Council, operates a shared lifeguard service for both Galway County Council and Galway City Council during the bathing season.

A lifeguard service will operate on an extended basis for the Summer months, **lifeguard hours** are 11am - 7pm, times are subject to change depending on availability of lifeguards and resources at the following locations:

- For the month of June the above locations will have a Lifeguard Service on weekends only (bank holidays included) from 11am until 7 pm.
- Locations 1-7 will then convert to a daily service for July and August with Lifeguards on duty from 11 am until 7 pm.
- A weekend only service will commence for the above on weekend 1 and 2 in September.

STREETSCAPE ENHANCEMENT MEASURES

The focus of this Measure is to support the upgrade and enhancement of shopfronts and street facades of defined areas within selected rural town/village centres. The areas being addressed currently are **An Spidéal**, **Portumna** and **Gort Town Centre**.

Shopfronts are a crucial element of the streetscape. Shopfronts should, therefore, be of a high standard of design and reflect the architecture of the original building and of the surrounding area.


It is the policy of the Council to preserve and retain traditional shop fronts that contribute to the character of our Towns and Villages. The need to change old shop fronts whether protected or not will be closely questioned.

Preference should be given feature of this coastal village. Taking to refurbishment rather than on board recommendations of a replacement. County Council seeks to encourage retail innovation, creativity, vitality and recognises the role shopfronts, signs and advertising can have on the character of a street

As part of ongoing investment in small growth villages, the location of An Spidéal along the Wild Atlantic, was approved for an allocation of €100k under the Town and Village Renewal Programme for Streetscape Enhancement in An Spidéal. Launched in 2023 some works were advanced last season with works continuing in 2024.

Galway County Council sought specific approval for allocation of funding under the Streetscape Scheme to repaint all street lighting on the Promenade and within the Village Centre, given this unique feature of this coastal village. Taking on board recommendations of a colour consultant the village will use a signature deep blue colour for lighting, bins and other Council



installed infrastructure. A supplier has been procured by the Municipal District with works commencing at the end of June. This initiative has been warmly welcomed by Tidy Towns and local businesses participating in the Scheme.

A Streetscape Enhancement Scheme for Portumna Town Centre, designated as a Small Growth Town, will be completed by the end of July 2024. **Over 70 properties have benefitted with grants** towards the painting of facades on St. Brendan's Street, Patricks Street and Abbey Street.

Gort Streetscape was launched on June 25th 2024 with applications now being sought. **Over 100 properties are eligible to apply** and this may be the largest Scheme to date which is being promoted by the Gort Town Team and is an action of the Gort Town Centre First Plan. Gort is a service town with nearby Coole Park and its proximity to the Burren and both the WAW and Hidden Heartlands region

Galway County Council secured funding under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme and is engaging services of a Colour Consultant to advise property owners. It is hoped that there is strong visual improvement in the presentation of the Town by property owners and tenants as result of the Scheme which will contribute to the overall vibrancy of the Town Centre and renew its role as service town for visitor to the Wild Atlantic Way and Hidden Heartlands region, Coole Park and Burren Region.

Furthermore, upgrades to Gort Playground were achieved under the 2023 Community Recognition Fund.

TUAM

Green Flag status had been retained in June 2023 for the Palace Grounds in Tuam from 'an Taisce'. Galway County Council were also successful in our application for 'Green Heritage Site Accreditation', a first for Galway County Council, this is awarded to public green spaces of historical and cultural significance.

Galway County Council applied in April for the Green Flag and Green Heritage Awards again in 2024. It is important this award is continued, and every effort is put in to ensure its success, it remains the only park within Galway County Councils ownership that has these awards. This is a hugely positive award for Galway County Council, for our friends in Tuam Tidy Towns (who helped with the Management Plan) and for local schools, community groups and the general public. Judges from An Taisce are to visit the Park in July to carry out a full survey.

The Community Employment scheme employees along with the Tuam MD outdoor staff continue to maintain and enhance the Park throughout the year by managing the trees, biodiversity, and grass areas. Throughout the year Galway County Council are removing dead and non-native trees and replacing them with native species. During the summer months biodiversity areas are kept with non- cutting of grass areas.




Other works that have occurred recently in the park include replacement of existing walkways and the commencement of a Sensory Garden. Our Biodiversity officer in GCC, council team, the secondary students of the Tuam Schools, women's shed, and volunteers planted hundreds of new trees in the park recently to mark national Tree week. The new trees are all native species, and they will mature beautifully over the coming years and decades. A new Fit Stick Walking and exercise station was also installed recently in the Palace Grounds

Ballyglunin Railway Station

Outside of public parks Green Flag Community Awards were awarded to Ballyglunin Railway Restoration Project. Ballyglunin Station holds an An Taisce Community Green Flag Award from An Taisce, the international benchmark standard for parks and green spaces, only awarded for exceeding stringent environmental standards in green space management and excellence in visitor attractions.


Volunteers have planted an Irish native orchard, wildflower meadow and installed bee-friendly window boxes and a 'bug hotel' . 6,000 square feet of lawn has also been preserved to allow a natural clover area to develop to provide a vital feeding habitat for our native bees, insects, and pollinator species.



TUAM

The entrance to Ballyglunin Railway Station has been freshly paved with a new tarmac, accompanied by the installation of a brand-new footpath. These improvements are not just about enhancing the visual appeal but also prioritizing safety for all pedestrians. The addition of new street lighting will further ensure a safer environment for pedestrians.

Ballyglunin Station is part of a wider story of local heritage sites that include manor houses, gate lodges, bridges, gates, walls, ringforts, cairns, a waterfall, weir, mill, icehouse, chapel, and monastery best explored on foot. Recognised by Galway County Council as part of the Golden Mile initiative, the Ballyglunin Heritage Trail passes through a peaceful rural countryside with the diversity of rural roadways, stonewalls, flora and fauna, along with the many heritage gems of 'Golden Mile' at Ballyglunin.



LOUGHREA

Marina, Portumna

Facilities are available year-round to users of the facility.

All bathing area Public Toilets have been fully reopened since Friday the 31st May. Signage is in place to indicate to the public the opening times at all three locations i.e. Traught Beach, The Long Point, Loughrea and the Swimming Area, Portumna.



Traught Beach

A seasonal caretaker is in position and will monitor and address any issues as required. Designated parking, toilets, picnic benches and cycle parking facilities are available. The Tawnagh Causeway which forms part of the access road to Traught Beach was badly damaged by Storm Debi. Restoration works will shortly be underway with a specialist conservation contractor currently being appointed.



Swimming Area, Portumna

This location is maintained by a combination of a shared permanent caretaker and outdoor staff who will continue to monitor and address any issues as they arise. Designated parking, picnic benches and cycle parking racks are available.

Long Point

This area is monitored and maintained by the Loughrea Town Gardener. When absent, alternative arrangements are made in combination with our outdoor staff. The toilet and shower facility is open throughout the day and the location is also additionally monitored from a litter collection perspective each weekend. There are no obvious parking issues most times, except those all too rare periods of particularly good and prolonged weather. Solar powered compacting bins, cycle racks, a water dispenser and disabled friendly picnic benches are available. Additional seating and lake access ladders have been installed recently.



CONNEMARA

Summer is rapidly approaching and in the Conamara Municipal District, we are preparing for the arrival of visitors to the area.

In line with last summer, we are again rolling out an increased level of services to our beaches. This will include the provision of toilets and/or refuse bins at a number of our most-visited beaches from 31st May 2024 as follows:

All facilities will be serviced regularly as required.

We are again expecting a flurry of outdoor leisure and sporting activities on land as well as at sea, such as windsurfing, cycling, boating, hill walking, paddle boarding, to name but a few.



BALLINASLOE



Over the summer, Galway County Council carries out grass cutting of parks, public spaces, road verges, green areas in housing estates, (1st cut mid-March, last cut early October) while supporting nature and pollinators by leaving some designated area uncut.

In Laurencetown, the council's own Community Employment Scheme maintains the village with litter picking and grass cutting.

Galway County Council will be using a mechanical brusher to remove weeds and vegetation on Ballinasloe Town's Streets as an environmentally friendly alternative to the use of pesticides. Galway County Council have installed the annual flower boxes and flower towers around Ballinasloe Town for the Summer to welcome visitors and brighten up the town.

Seven existing Disabled Parking facilities in Ballinasloe Town have been painted blue to highlight them on Dunlo Street, Society Street and Main Street.



BALLINASLOE



Facilities for cycling in the Ballinasloe Municipal District have been installed in 2023, including additional bicycle stands and service stands around Ballinasloe Town and villages in the Municipal District.

New footpaths have been provided in Ballinasloe Town including a new section along Beechlawn funded under Active Travel to provide a new walking route around the South side of Ballinasloe Town. New Bins have been installed in Ballinasloe Town and Aughrim Village.

During the summer, further bins will be upgraded at Callow Lough, Kilconnell, and in Ballinasloe Town at Bully's acre/Famine memorial park, Townparks and Brackenagh.



Cruinniú na nÓg - June 15th

Cruinniú na nÓg (Saturday 15th June 2024) is the annual National Day of Creativity for children and young people. It aims to celebrate and encourage children and young people's participation in culture and creativity by providing free, accessible, activity-based creative action in their own locality.

The emphasis of Cruinniú na nÓg is on doing, making, and creating. Ireland is the first, and only, country in the world to have a national day of free creativity for children and young people under 18. The guiding principle of Cruinniú 2023 is to empower children and young people to develop their creative expression through creative activities in their local area. Galway Public Library Summer events for Cruinniú na nÓg will take place in many of our branch libraries. All events will be advertised on social media.

Activity examples include:

Portumna Library will host two workshops which will be delivered by local artist and workshop leader Laurie Legrand:

"The secret life of a superhero" Quiet storytelling and drawing 11am to 1pm (8 to 12-years-old)

"Selfies at the Portrait Museum" Painting, Drawing, Writing and Collage 2- 4pm (10 to 14-yearsold)



Ballinasloe Library – Sowing Creativity

We will create a sensory garden in their outside courtyard. The sensory garden will stimulate and engage the five basic senses of sight, smell, sound, touch and taste. A local horticulturalist will oversee the placing of selected sensory plants in special wheelchair accessible containers.

These plants will be selected based on their scents, colours, and textures. The creation of the small garden will take place during two slots, one in the morning and one in the afternoon on June 15th.

Tuam Library - Sparkcatchers! & the re-imagining of Ireland's oldest myth Cessair of Cnocmea

Tuam Library will host an interactive storytelling show with puppets for 6–12-year-olds, reimagining the mythology of Cnocmea, performed and created by Tuam teenagers.

Workshops for teenagers will be delivered by Jojo Hynes and Midie Corcoran over 6 weeks. They will deliver 3 half day and 3 full day workshops in performative storytelling, music and prop making. The CYC will co-write the script, compose music, create props and puppets for a 30-minute show at the Tuam Library.

Oranmore Library -Mini Music Explorers

Oranmore Library will host Mini Music Explorers led by Early Music Years Academy. This fulfilled and energetic workshop will incorporate singing, movement of dance, basic percussion with Maraca's and Mini Tambourines and some musical games. It is aimed at children 3-5 years old.



The Summer Stars reading programme was launched in June. Children's author Mary Murphy visited Inisbofin & Clifden Libraries and Letterfrack N.S reading stories, drawing and creating giant doodles with the children. The exhilarating atmosphere continued in Tuam Library with facepainting & balloon- making and the arrival of the magical School's Library mobile with its painted themes of life in our woodlands and life under the sea.

We'll be celebrating Summer Stars and Galway Public Libraries 100th Birthday this summer with loads of events for children in libraries across the county, including author visits from Niamh Doyle and Serena Molloy; comic making workshops as Gaeilge with Coimicí Gael; Fairy shows from Jay Ryan; biodiversity workshops; arts and crafts; storytelling sessions; speech, drama, and lots more.

HIGH SPEED BROADBAND CONNECTION

Broadband Connection Points (BCPs)

Under the National Broadband Plan, Broadband Connection Points (BCPs) serve as public locations offering Highspeed connectivity. They were some of the first locations in the state to receive High speed broadband under the state intervention contract. The set up of BCP's is considered by the government as longterm investment, which will help rural communities to fulfil their full potential. It is part of the 'Connected Communities Initiative' between the Government, NBI and Vodafone.

Currently, there are 21 live BCPs across the county, including the islands of Inishbofin, Inis Mór, Inis Meain, and Inis Oír. Some of these chosen BCPs are strategically placed in tourism destinations, such as the Portumna Irish Workhouse Centre Famine Museum. Each BCP provides free external Wi-Fi access to the public, with several locations also offering excellent facilities for remote work, study, digital skill training, and promotion of arts and culture.

BCPs play a vital role in supporting their communities by emphasising digital inclusion, digital skills, community engagement, and various activities.

Additionally, they offer a social space for in-person connections among community members, contributing to overall health and well-being. Access to these resources expands choices and opportunities for community members. Galway County Council leverages the PPN network to promote BCPs.

MICROSOFT GENERATIVE A SKILLS AT INISHBOFIN BCP

The Galway County Council Broadband Office recently collaborated with Microsoft to facilitate and promote the implementation of a Microsoft Generative AI Course in County Galway. On May 16, 2024, the first of these Microsoft funded courses was delivered in Inishbofin BCP. The course received an overwhelmingly positive response, with participants expressing great enthusiasm about the AI tools and their potential benefits for business.

Generative AI is an exciting field within artificial intelligence that enables machines to create new content by learning from existing data. Whether it's generating text, images, music, or even code, generative AI empowers creativity and problem-solving.

"Designed by Microsoft, in partnership with LinkedIn and GitHub, Skills for Jobs is a global skills initiative, which provides free access to training in 8 career pathways identified as the most in-demand jobs in the digital economy. This training will focus on the Generative AI career pathway'.

Microsoft Generative AI Skills in Ballyglunin BCP:

On June 19, 2024, another Microsoft Generative AI Skills course took place at the Ballyglunin BCP, situated at the Railway Station in Ballyglunin, Co. Galway. Once again, this course received an overwhelmingly positive response.

Farm IT Skills in Lackagh BCP:

Digital skills training sessions for the agricultural sector have also been facilitated by the Galway Roscommon Educational Training Board (GRETB). Two sessions have been run to date in the Lackagh BCP.

Digital Skills for Older People:

Initiation of digital literacy courses for the elderly is underway. These sessions are facilitated by Age Action Ireland. In the year 2022, these educational programs were extended to seniors at three BCP locations and were met with positive reception. The funding for these classes came from the Department of Rural and Community Development, supplemented by support from C&E.



Visual & Creative Arts:

Several BCPs have participated in a Visual Arts Workshop called 'Tide Lines' run by The Ark cultural centre for children and supported by the Department of Rural and Community Development. They have also participated in showing Creative Art Screenings in the BCP as 'The Race' by Ark which entwined three of Aesop's Fables to create a fun, interactive and colourful world of animals, puppets, theatre, and movement. The Race was filmed with support from the Department of Education, the Department of Rural & Community Development and Rethink Ireland.

BATTLE OF AUGHRIM VISITOR CENTRE

The centre offers visitors:

- Interpretative and artefacts display
- New Educational/Learning zone
- Children's worksheets, costume dress-up
- Self-guided driving, cycling or walking trail of the battlefield (full trail route approx. 10km)
- Free car parking & baby changing facilities
- Fully accessible
- Children's playground and park adjacent to Centre
- Guided tours of battlefield on request

At the **Battle of Aughrim Visitor Centre**, visitors can learn about how three rival European Kings took hold of Ireland in their struggle for power with over 45,000 soldiers gathering in Aughrim in 1691. The centre is located in the heart of Aughrim Village just 7km from Ballinasloe and 22km from Loughrea.


